Atlantic Canada is rural in nature and its residents have come to rely on VIA Rail as their major source of transportation to the rest of the nation.

In 1985 the VIA Atlantic Line was reinstated by the Government with the stipulation: "Use it or lose it". Atlantic Canadians have done this. More than 240,000 persons rode the rails in 1988, a quantitative increase over previous years.

Atlantic Canadians have kept their end of the bargain and are now looking to the federal Government to honour its commitment of 1985 to keep the VIA Atlantic Line open.
