GAVE WARNING AGAINST BECKER

Brother-in-Law of Police Lieutenant Complained to Mayor.

NEW YORK, March 20 .- (Can. ress.)-Letters were read today before the aldermanic committee investifore the aldermanic committee investigating police graft showing that Mayor Gaynor and Police Commissioner Waldo were warned against the character of Police Lieutenant Charles Becker as far back as August, 1911. John F. Lynch, brother-in-law of Becker, who is now in the death house at Sing Sing for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, bitterly denounced the former police officer in a letter to the mayor. The letter was referred to Commissioner Waldo, who told the mayor that "this seems to be a family mayor that "this seems to be a family row." and "Becker is doing excellen

work."

"One of my sisters is, unfortunately, his wife, works for him, teaches school," Lynch wrote of Becker, "and he, hero-like, takes her money. She being away, he asked another of my sisters to come to his house yesterday to cook, but immediately attempted to assault her. She successfully resisted him, threatening to cut him with a carving knife, whereupon he got his carving knife, whereupon he got his revolver and shouted that he would shoot her. By yelling 'murder' she was able to get out. He threatened her with arrest, and said he would get her with arrest, and said he would get one of his squad to catch her on the street some night and lock her up for soliciting. She came home crying and with her waist torn."

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS REGULATIONS

ANY person who is the sole head of 2 family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, or certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Dutles—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cuttivate fifty acres extra.
