He had been in Ann Arbor year before last, visiting the largest University on this continent, the President of which was at that time entirely opposed to permitting female students to attend College; but what was the case to-day? The doors of that University were thrown open to women, and so it was now in some of the first colleges of the old and new worlds. Wherever you go abroad you hear McGill College highly spoken of. But why is this? Because it has hitherto kept on the top of the wave of progress, and that wave now sets towards throwing open colleges to women. Let not McGill now lag behind. He was convinced that the public mind is ripe for this change, and that its popularity would greatly aid the present effort to endow the College adequately. Dr. Wilkes said this was a subject which had occupied a good deal of his attention, and which he regarded as of very great importance. Several gentlemen spoke conversationally in favor of it, and the resolution passed unanimously.—*Witness.*

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
