L. M. MARSH.

A Veteran Who Traveled 1,500 Miles to Attend Reunion of Comrades.

Watertown, Oct. 7.—Among the veterans of the One Hundred and Eighty-sixth Regiment, New York Volunteer Infantry, who attended the reunion recently held at Sackets Harbor was L. M. Marsh, who was adjutant of the regiment. Adjt. Marsh is a native of Jefferson county and a graduate of the State Normal School at Albany. When the One Hundred and Eighty-sixth was raised he enlisted in Company C and was made second lieutenant of his company. At the battle of Hatcher's Run he was promoted on the field for bravery displayed in the action. Mr. Marsh returned to this county after the war, where he married the daughter of the late Samuel Wetmore, of Adams. He went to Iowa soon after his marriage, where he has since resided. Mr. Marsh made the journey of 1,500 miles to attend the reunion and meet
