The above (in substance, some expressions too flattering and complimentary for the public eye, having been omitted) was signed by seventy-four persons in the immediate vicinity of the Sherbrooke church, it not having been more remotely known; and having received the refusal of only four persons, whose signature would have been less creditable to my orthodoxy than their silence. Many of the expressions retained are much too flattering, and I may perhaps be accused of vanity in making them public. Without pretending to be less influenced by personal vanity than my neighbours, I must be allowed to say, that they never would have been made public by my own act, under any other circumstances than those in which I am unmeritedly placed.
