THADE ADJUSTED TO BRITISH MARKETS

"Why Throw Everything Into Confusion ?" Asks Hon, James Duff, at Anti-Reciprocity Meeting.

COLLINGWOOD, May 21.-(Special.) -A meeting to discuss the question of reciprocity was held here last even-ing in the opera house. Owing to the abnormally hot weather the attendance was not so good as at previous meetings in the vicinity, but what the meeting lacked in numbers, it made up in enthusiasm and attention. The audience was composed principally of farmers from the neighborhood.

Alex. Ferguson, M.L.A., said that when reciprocity was first suggested he thought it might be a good thing for the farmers. After giving the ques-toon some study he was of the opin-ion that it would do more to destroy the prosperity of the Canadian farmers than anything that could happen to them. American public men were all telling their farmers that eciprocity would benefit them, and give them access to the Canadian markets, where, owing to the season being earlier in the States, they would get on the market first. If reciprocity was going to make the American farmer rich, was certainly going to make the Can-adlan farmer so much poorer. The Canadian farmer would have twelve competitors, where before he had only one. The price of hogs and other farm products had already fallen, as buyers would only buy from hand to mouth in Canada, as they feared reciprocity. Hon. Jas. Duff, minister of agriculture, who is leaving in a few days to Europe, was very warmly applauded as he was introduced by the chairman as "the people's Jimmy." When the farmers were prosperous the villages, towns and cities were prosperous, Canadian workingmen realized that the measure of their prosperity was contained in national prosperity, and employment just as much as in high wages. The one was the complement of the other. workingmen were unanimous against the reciprocity deal, because they were keen students of affairs. Laurier tried to hoodwink the farmers.
