AGRICULTURAL AND SANITARY IMPROVEMENT.

To a young and rapidly developing country, such as Canada is, nothing can be of more obvious and permanent value than the encouragement of these methods and processes which can best secure the most profitable use of its land and the discouragement of those conditions which endanger the public health.

Mr. James introduces his article by a sketch of agricultural organization in Ontario, which has now been systematized into nine branches, each in charge of a responsible official. These include the agricultural and veterinary colleges, the agricultural and horticultural societies, live stock, farmers and women's institutes, dairy and fruit farming, colonization and statistics and publications. All co-operate in improving the farming industry of the province, and the need of this is revealed by the fact that the rural population has been practically stationary since 1872.

Writing editorially in a recent issue "Financial America" of New York gives some striking examples of stock watering, a process which it remarks is a subject of unflinching interest to all students of investment or speculation. Technically, it explains, stock watering implies an increase of nominal corporate capitalization without a corresponding additional investment of funds.

It proceeds to state that the actual cost of the Central Pacific was \$58,000,000, yet \$120,000,000 was paid to the contractors, giving them a clear profit over and above the full cost of the road of \$62,000,000 in securities.

Financial America gives other examples of later date and of a different kind. It quotes the Great Northern's gift of Lake Superior ore-land certificates to its shareholders. Including these the returns to stockholders within a single year approximated 147 per cent. Mr. W. Z. Ripley, writing in The Political Science Quarterly for March, puts the net result of various stock operations of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western as equivalent to a dividend of 187.5 per cent., establishing "a new record even among the most prosperous of the anthracite coal roads."
