Houston, Texas, Nov. 9.-A despatch from Laredo, Texas, says: Four Texas rangers sent to RI Grande City to quiet turbulent politi-

The rangers were asleep in camp when awakened by a volley of shots from the darkness. A pitched battle ensued and four of the attacking party were killed, one fatally wounded and two captured. The rangers escaped unscathed. Governor Lanham to-day ordered
