DECLARES CANCER CURABLE

Doctor Says Fifty Per Cent of Victims Can Be Saved. Chicago, Ill., Nov. 9.—Cancer is far from incurable, according to Dr. Nicholas Senn. In a lecture on "The Problem of Cancer," in the University of Chicago, Dr. Senn declared 50 per cent of the cases brought to the attention of physicians in the earliest stages might be cured.

Dr. Senn advocated the establishment of a bureau to keep the public informed as to the nature and possible cures of cancer, as is done in some cities of Europe. Many victims of cancer, he said, prevented cures by becoming dependent and keeping away from good physicians.

"If the disease is detected in its early stages a cure may be effected," said Dr. Senn, "but if it is allowed to go to an advanced stage nothing can be done."

EARL GREY'S SUNDAY SPORT REBUKED BY THE ALLIANCE

Resolution of Appreciation Submitted Because of Alleged Sabbath Hunting Incident.

The conduct of His Excellency Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, in his disregard of the Sabbath in preparing on Sunday for a shooting expedition, met with censure at the annual meeting of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance yesterday afternoon, when the committee on resolutions reported that an expression of thanks should be expressed towards his excellency in recognition of his sympathy and assistance with the objects of the alliance.

The reading of the resolution brought forth a protest from Rev. Mr. Scott, who stated that he had read in the newspapers a report of hunting expeditions that the governor-general had planned for on Sunday. He was sure that he was correct and in view of this fact thought it would be ridiculous to have such a resolution go on the records of the association.

Other dissenting voices were heard, and upon the suggestion of J. K. Macdonald, president of the association, it was decided to leave the name of Earl Grey out of the resolution.

A resolution of loyalty to King Edward was carried and the dozen or so delegates present sang "God Save the King."

At the morning session, which was poorly attended, C. J. Copp, M.D., the treasurer, reported contributions during the year of 1877 and disbursements \$6547.83, leaving a balance of \$235.07.

The election of officers in the afternoon resulted: President, K. Macdonald; Vice-presidents, R. A. Carman, Rt. Rev. W. L. Mills, Rev. S. D. Chown, Rev. L. N. Tucker, Hon. E. H. Bronson, Chancellor, A. C. MacKay, Rev. A. D. Herbert.

Secretary, Rev. T. Albert Moore; assistant secretary, Rev. J. G. Shearer; treasurer, Charles J. Copp, M.D.; auditor, Robert Rae, J. Crombie.

Resolutions. Following is the report of the committee on resolutions, which was presented and adopted: "That we put on record our most hearty appreciation of the splendid work done by our secretaries during the past year. Through the country they have done excellent service in arousing a healthy sentiment in favor of the proper observance of the day of rest, and in eliciting the sympathy and cooperation of the various classes in the community. In our legislative halls the influence of their statesmanlike advocacy of our cause has been a powerful factor in securing the advanced legislation, both Dominion and provincial, we now possess. And we would hereby express our continued confidence in them and renew our pledge of loyalty to them as our leaders."

"That while we express our gratitude to the legislature of this province for their action in enacting laws which place the whole question of Sunday operation of electric railways in a more satisfactory position, at the same time we would urge the standing committee on legislation of Ontario Lord's Day Alliance to continue to vigilantly press for such changes as are in the opinion of this annual meeting it is still desirable to obtain."

"We would express our gratification with the judgment of Police Magistrate Love of London, holding that an eating-house proprietor has not the right to almost continuously sell ice-cream on Sunday to persons who purchase ice-cream alone, and who consume the same as a confection, and not as a necessary food in the case of William W. Mandas, and directs the legal committee, in case this decision is appealed against, to bring the matter promptly to the notice of the attorney-general, requesting him to make the crown a party in the case in defence of the Lord's Day Act as thus interpreted."

The thanks of the convention were tendered to Robert Rae, C.A., and A. T. Crombie, auditors.

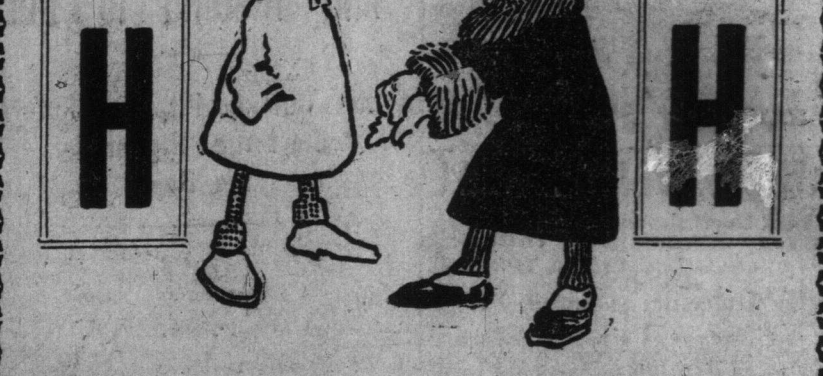

TEXAS RANGERS AMBUSHED FOUR OF ATTACKERS DEAD

Police Were Going to Rio Grande to Quiet Situation Arising Out of Election Murder.

Houston, Texas, Nov. 9.—A despatch from Laredo, Texas, says: Four Texas rangers sent to Rio Grande City to quiet turbulent political conditions there and investigate the assassination of District Judge Welch, which occurred the night before the elections, were ambushed by a body of armed Mexicans between Fordyce and Rio Grande City late last night.

The rangers were asleep in camp when awakened by a volley of shots from the darkness. A pitched battle ensued and four of the attacking party were killed, one fatally wounded and two captured. The rangers escaped unscathed.

Governor Lanham to-day ordered a company of cavalry to Starr County, and a special train is now carrying the troops on a fast run.

Several political clubs controlling the Mexican vote patrolled the voting places on election day and refused to allow members of the opposing faction to vote.

Several shooting affrays occurred, but no one was killed or wounded. It was charged by one faction that Judge Welch was murdered by a hired assassin, and that last night's ambushade of rangers was instigated by the same faction.

There are reports here of continued rioting at Rio Grande City, the extent of which is not now known.
