"An Unfounded Criticism," The Toronto Star of Wednesday said editorially:

Rev. Robert Ker, who so bitterly denounced the daily press yesterday, must have been reading the Buffalo or New York city yellow journals, which, it is reported, have quite a sale in the Magara Pendingula, where Mr. Ker resides. Certainly Mr. Ker cannot have been reading the papers of his own city, which were never guilty of sensationalism, nor can he have perused several Toronto papers, which keep their columns free of the objectionable matter he so much deplores. Or perhaps, if Mr. Ker has escaped the yellow journals that come across the line and circulate in St. Catharines, he may, instead of reading the respectable Canadian papers, have grown reminiscent and confounded the press of to-day with that of the time when he was a reporter, at a time when the secular press, as he terms it, was of a distinctly lower tone. If Mr. Ker were to read the daily papers as diligently as a critic should read them, and were to recall the press of the time when he helped make it, he would find that the press of to-day has taken a much higher plane, and that cases and events which even a few years ago would have been seized upon eagerly and printed, and read with gusto, now are ignored or condensed and hidden away in obscure corners. 
