

U.S. COMMISSARY BOODLING

Capt. James C. Reed Appears to Have Collected Toll on Almost All the Supplies.

ONE WITNESS ASKED PROTECTION.

Said He Had Been Threatened, and Was Afraid to Give His Evidence.

Manila, April 30.—The trial of Captain James C. Reed, ex-depot commissary at Manila, was continued to-day, and was fiercely contested. Thomas Harries, a bookkeeper of the firm of Robinson & Macandray, testified that Mr. Reed had collected toll on almost all the supplies.

Mr. Reed Macandray testified that he arranged to give Captain Reed 10 per cent. commission on the sales of vegetables furnished to the troops.

Before testifying, Mr. Reed Baldwin, formerly United States Marshal for California, and now manager of the Macandray Company, shipping merchants, made a statement to the court. He said that attempts had been made to intimidate him, and he asked for the protection of the court.

Mr. Baldwin testified to having a \$2000.00 beef contract. Captain Reed had come to his office and asserted that there were slight shortages in the beef deliveries, on account of which Mr. Baldwin gave Captain Reed \$248.

An Alleged Heavy Shortage. Adjutant General Davidson testified that Captain Reed had said Major Davis was short 14,000 pounds of beef. He admitted receiving money from Mr. Baldwin, but said the sum he received would be applied to the beef shortage.

Wolf, a partner in the firm of Castle Bros., testified concerning attempts to secure commission for Captain Reed out of the sales of vegetables, etc.

Col. Woodruff, head of the Subsistence Department at Manila, gave testimony regarding the number of cigars supplied to the troops.

R. Carson, chief clerk of the depot commissary, testified to once obtaining funds from the bank, and to a shortage being covered by placing five laborers, at 40 cents per day, on the emergency pay roll.

This witness also testified concerning the investigation into the irregularities of the depot commissary.

J. J. Macleod, manager of the Maritime Company, testified that he procured for Captain Reed receipts from the General Clearing House showing the amount of commission paid by Castle Bros. and Wolf.

The prosecution then rested. The defence will begin to-morrow.

WILL SEARCH TO THE END. Edward Cuddey Receives a Letter Offering to Square Matters for \$21,000 of the Ransom.

Omaha, Neb., April 30.—Edward Cuddey has received a letter purporting to come from the person who kidnapped his son, Edward, on Dec. 25 last, and received a ransom of \$25,000 in gold, offering to return \$21,000 of the ransom if the reward for their arrest shall be withdrawn and the search abandoned.

This proposition came in a letter from Eliza, Ill., and Mr. Cuddey is convinced of its authenticity. Mr. Cuddey has refused to consider the proposition, and declared his determination to prosecute the search to the end.

TO STIFLE THE PRESS. Singular Order Issued in a Murder Trial Being Held at Toledo.

Toledo, Ohio, April 30.—When the case of Charles Proctor, under indictment for the murder of W. C. Johnson, the clergyman, was called in Common Pleas Court, Judge Houston G. Young entered the following singular order against the press:

"The court is moved to make an order restraining any person from sending for publication any of the evidence given in the trial of Charles Proctor, or anything purporting to be evidence given in this case in the trial of said case."

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
