Experimenters and chemists have of late been making tests with the machine, and many of them state that all that Moissan cidims for it is true.

Dr. Edgar Smith, vice provost and professor of chemistry in the University of Pennsylvania, has made tiny, perfect diamonds with the machine. The cost of making them, however, far exceeds their value. They are not large enough for usen trade.

The chief problem in the formation of large crystals is the proper method of cooling the heated mass, and as the present operations are only a beginning chemists are confident that it will not be long before diamonds of considerable size are made.

Diamonds and graphite are pure carbon, and are produced by heating that substance to a high degree under pressure of expanding iron. The mass is cooled quickly, air being entirely excluded from it, and a diamond is the result. If the cooling process be slow, and there is but little pressure, graphite is formed.

This is the theory of the Moissan machine. A cylinder of soft iron is partially filled with pure sugar of charcoal. The hole plugged with soft iron. The cylinder is then placed in a carbon pot filled with molten iron, connected with powerfall electrodes and heated to at least 3500 degrees Centigrade. Crystallization is thus caused. The cylinder is quickly cooled. It is then thrown into hydrochloric acid and the iron dissolved, thus freeing the crystals.
