## Pope's Wonderful Vitality Bears Him Up Successful Operation Followed by Restless Sleep Cardinal Gotti Alone With the Pontiff

All Signs Point to the Passing of the Aged Patient in a Few Hours.

**BULLETIN.**  
8.15 a.m.—Pope Leo is now in a troubled sleep.  
8.25 a.m.—It is hoped that the Pope's strength will be maintained, as he has taken somewhat more nourishment, especially by the yolks of an egg with small signs of a stimulant, especially brandy.  
8.30 p.m.—The condition of the Pope continues sufficiently satisfactory. His circulation and breathing are slow, but they are gradually improving.  
8.45 p.m.—After the operation Dr. Mazzoni said the illness remained imminent, but the illness from which the Pope was suffering was full of surprises. His Holiness might even live three days longer.

### DR. MAZZONI'S OPINION.

Does Not Believe That Death Will Occur Yet.  
Rome, July 7.—(Special.)—Dr. Mazzoni, assisted by Dr. Lapponi, who is also a doctor, has just finished the analysis from the liquid extracted from the Pope's pleura. It is composed of blood with coagulated fibrine without pus. What is feared is a reproduction of serum in the pleura, in which case the operation will be repeated in about two days.  
10.55 p.m.—Dr. Mazzoni has been besieged by relatives and friends of the Pope and his entourage, inquiring as to the result of the operation. To the Associated Press correspondent he said: "When I consider that the Pope should be dead by this time the unexpected may happen, and there is still time to say anything positive. ### POPE OPERATED ON.

Pleura Punctured and the Aged Patient is Relieved.  
Rome, July 7, 2.30 p.m.—The Pope has been operated upon and his general condition is now better. The immediate direction of the operation devolved on Mazzoni, who handled the instrument and made the preparatory arrangements. First a slight incision was made in the side of the venerable patient. A solution of alcohol and cocaine was used to deaden the sensation. The point of operation was just below the seventh rib and the operation itself consisted in the insertion of a large Pravaz needle. ### WHEN A POPE DIES.

The Demise of the Pontiff Will Revolve Strange Rites.  
Rome, July 6.—The death of the Pope, which now seems near at hand, and the election of a new one will revolve at the Vatican many curious ceremonies which have not been witnessed for a quarter of a century, or since the death of Pius IX. in 1878. When the physicians certify that his holiness has ceased to live the cardinal usually occurs a panic among the people.

### FIGHT PARLIAMENT FOR MUNICIPAL RIGHTS

Under Pressure Minister Blair Promises to Consult Interests of Municipalities.  
Municipalities Aroused.  
Ottawa, July 7.—(Special.)—A conference was held to-night by Mayor Urquhart, Toronto; Mayor Cook, ex-Mayor of Hamilton; Westmount and ex-Mayor Morris, on the question of corporate assault upon municipal rights. In view of the aggression of the Toronto Street Railway Commission, the companies the conference discussed the advisability of calling a meeting of the representatives of all the Canadian municipalities at Ottawa to take steps to meet the issue.

### MUNICIPALITIES AROUSED.

Ottawa, July 7.—(From our own man.)—The assumed rights of electric railways to enter upon the streets of a city or town without the consent of the municipality provoked a keen debate in the House to-night. Clause 184 of Mr. Blair's Railway Commission bill brought on the discussion. To this clause Mr. Blair had prepared an amendment which was strikingly inadequate to the situation, and which, in fact, afforded the municipalities no more protection than the clause in its original form.

### Man Falls From High Seat Hangs to Rope 60 Feet Up

Artist Andrew and His Aerial Experience.  
The swaying figure of a man clinging frantically to the end of a rope at the top of the Cyclorama building was the startling spectacle witnessed by persons around the Union Station yesterday morning. This was the plight of Maxwell Andrew, a sign painter, whose scaffold had given way, suspending him sixty feet above the pavement. For ten minutes he hung there in imminent danger of being dashed to pieces. Then with an exhibition of great presence of mind, and by the aid of his companions, he was drawn to the roof of the building and to safety. In the street below many people held their breath and watched the struggle in mid-air. At the conclusion of the thrilling scene they cheered the hero of the accident. Ten minutes later he had rigged a new scaffold, and with his companions was using his brushes as if it was nothing unusual to be precipitated suddenly from his ladder to dangle at the rope's end high up above the ground.

### Hope of Municipal 'Hops' To Enter Railway Stations

Locust Hill Fight Has at Last Accomplished Part of Its Object.  
Ottawa, July 7.—(Special.)—A number of amendments were proposed to Mr. Blair's Railway Commission Bill to-day, but the overshadowing one relates to the right of municipal telephone systems to gain access to railway stations. It will be seen that the fight which had its origin at Locust Hill has spread to wide proportions, and has finally accomplished at least part of its objects.



## LIBERALS ARE IN ARMS AGAINST PARTY BOSSES

Oshawa, July 7.—(From a staff correspondent.)—This town is divided into several political camps. Tamblin to the postmastership of Oshawa. James Carmichael, who filled the office for 26 years, died on June 14, at the age of 82 years, and on the following Wednesday the official announcement was made that Mr. Tamblin had been appointed, also the position was really filled on Monday, the day after Mr. Carmichael's death.
