Lambs sold at \$2.50 to \$3 each, but having come from the Lower St. Lawrence, they were not as good as Ontario lambs. THE HOUSE OF QUALITY. SURVEY OF JAMES BAY RY. PROGRESS BEING MADE. E. G. Poole, the Engineer in Charge at York Mills, Talks to World Reporter.

York Mills, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—In conversation with The World here tonight E. G. Poole, the engineer in charge of the James Bay surveying party at present engaged in this district, the place of the company. "The party consists of 11 persons," he said. "The work at present is engaged in surveying party under an angry cry. During the winter months Mr. Poole stated he and his party engaged north of the Wahnapitoc, and that while from the shore certain unusual crooked the work progressed steadily. At the point where the James Bay River crosses the C.P.R. in the Don Valley it is some 70 feet under the road, which here crosses the Don, but the three large viaducts over the river.

WHAT YANKEES WILL DO. Washington, Aug. 4.—The action of the Russian fleet in the Gulf of Mexico, in the case of the Arabia is likely to develop the contention on the part of the United States government that foodstuffs on a neutral vessel are subject to seizure, even in the case of a neutral vessel, if it is found to be carrying contraband under the American flag. The Russian government, however, did not modify his previously expressed view that Admiral Jensen acted contrary to international law.
