London dealers are not pleased with the price set for sugar, some of them declaring that they cannot afford to handle it at a profit of one cent per pound. The retailer is obliged to pay 111/2 cents and by selling at 121/2 cents he is making a gross profit of only 71/2 per cent. Out of this he must allow for his overhead expenses, including delivery.

There is no doubt that the action of the board of commerce, if carried through consistently, will eliminate profiteering. By following the cost from producer to consumer unreasonable profits can be detected all along the line. This is well as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough. The people of Canada want to be able to live as cheaply as do those of other countries, and this they cannot do so long as they are taxed on every article imported. Take the case of sugar as an example. While sugar from the beet is being manufactured in Canada the greater part of the supply by far is imported. Most of the raw supply comes from the British West Indies, where the crop this year is large.
