### **POWER CURTAILED:** ICE IN NIAGARA RIVER TO BLAME

Fifty Per Cent Reduction Made This Morning in Hydro.

Fifty per cent reduction in the con-sumption of electricity was necessary in the city today because of ice interfering with power development at Niagara.
Although the river has been clear for some time ice from the lakes above has now commenced to come down stream, and has blocked the inlets of some of the power stations. the power stations.

The interruptions came without

warning to the general public and citizens were surprised when they found no current available in their homes this morning, although this was a common occurrence throughout the winter. Domestic circuits were the only ones which suffered, as power was supplied to the factories.

General Manager Buchanan said that the situation was not so serious as it would have been earlier in the year. Lights are not required in the morning to the same extent as a few weeks ago nd the general demand seems to be


