Race Was Superb Spectacle - Never More Than Few Hundred Yards Separat ed Yachts-Both Skippers Used All Strategy At Command.

SANDY HOOK, N. J., July 21.-Resolute, defender of the America's Cup, came back today after two straight defeats and won over the British challenger, Shamrock IV. Shamrock finished a scant half boat length ahead, with a lead of 19 seconds, but

a scant half boat length ahead, with a lead of 19 seconds, but as she gained precisely that advantage at the start the race was—miraculously in yachting events—a dead heat over the 30-mile course. Resolute won by the amount of her handicap, 7 minutes and 1 second. The fourth race of the series will be started Friday. Veteran yachtsmen who followed the trim craft through the hours, 3 minutes and 6 seconds of racing time thought back over that could compare with today's spectacle. It was a real yacht race from the start, and it provided a finish rivalling in closeness that of a neck-and-neck horse race.




