

IBA D. SANKEY DEAD SANG TO SAVE SOULS

Career of Man Who, With Moody, Attracted Millions to Religious Meetings.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.-Ira D. Sankey, the evangelist, died at his home in Brooklyn last night. Ira Sankey is dead.

The multitudes who have heard his rich and inspiring voice in "The Ninety and Nine," "Jesus of Nazareth Passeth By," and "When the Mists Have Rolled Away," will hear with sorrow that the greatest voice of modern times devoted to the work of the Master has

been silenced forever.

While Sankey had many successors in evangelistic hymnology, he was the His life was a stirring example of

the converting and sanctifying power of sacred song. He added a thrilling chapter to the triumph of the Cross. His biographer, Theodore L. Cuyler,

His biographer, Theodore L. Cuyler, wrote:

"His songs are a precious legacy by a faithful veteran of Jesus Christ to his fellow-soldiers in all lands who are battling for the cause of the crown of the glorious Captain of our salvation, and who 'wait for His appearing."

Ira D. Sankey was a son of Hon. David Sankey. He was born in the Village of Edinburg in Western Pennsylvania, Aug. 28, 1840. When six years old moved to Western Reserve Harbor, where his father engaged in a commission business. Later his father moved to a farm and the boy assisted in the work. Sankey, senior, was elected to the state legislature during the thirteen years of his life as a farmer. During these years the boy met a Mr. Fraser, who aroused his first interest in a holy life.

In 1857 the family moved to Newcastle, where the father became president of the bank. Here Ira attended high school and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon he was superintendent of the Sunday School and leader of the choir.

His voice attracted attention and before long the Sunday School came to hear crowded with people who came to hear

In 1860 he responded to the call of the civil war and his company was sent to Maryland. His father was appointed collector of inland revenue at Newcastle by Abraham Lincoln.

In 1863 Mr. Sankey married a member of his choir, Miss Fanny V. Edwards, a daughter of Hon. John Edwards.

Later he bacame secretary and then president of the Newcatle Y.M.C.A., and by the sale of gospel hymns raised \$40,000 for a new building. 340,000 for a new building.

In the centre of the fold." The air came to Sankey during an impromptu rendition of the words, which he had read first in a newsnaper on a train in Great Britain.
