large number of property owners against it. There was no doubt that the street was in bad condition at present. A sewer had been laid this spring, and as a result the road was uneven, and in fact unsafe. He thought that if some gravel and the steam roller were put on the road it would do for a long time.

Allow It to Settle.

Mr. McLeod thought it a mistake to put a pavement down at this time owing to the fact that it would take almost a year at least for the road to settle, on account of the city for the city hall this afternoon at 4.30 o'clock to arrange the details for the celebration. The Mardi Gras committee of the Old Boys will meet tonight also.

Mr. F. C. Fraser said that there were 1,087 feet frontage on the street and practically all the demand for the pavement came from Perrins, who own 262 feet. He did not think it fair that the owners who control 255 feet of the frontage, should be taxed because the owners of a much smaller part desired a pavement.

Ald. Rose thought the matter should be put over for another year. It had been the practice of the committee not to lay a pavement on a street for a year after a sewer had been built on it, and in this case the same rule should be followed. The sewer contractor must keep the street in repair for nine months more, and he was of the opinion if that were done there would be little cause for complaint.

The contract for the asphalt block pavement on Carling street, between Richmond and Talbot streets, was awarded to Blight & Fielder, for \$3,634, which was \$31 less than the tender of the Forest City Paving Company.

Ald. Rose informed the chairman that many of the cement walks in the city were out of repair, and that they should be gone over by contractors who built them.

City Engineer Graydon informed the committee that he was making a list of walks out of repair, and was notifying the contractors to have them repaired as soon as possible. This is being done now in some instances, and he expects that the work will be finished shortly.

Breakwater Property.

A communication was received from City Solicitor Meredith regarding the title of the property on Carrothers street, on which the breakwater is situated, and which is claimed by Mrs. Westby, but as an opinion as to who owned the property was not given, the matter was again laid over. An effort will be made to get an opinion on that as soon as possible.

"The city owns that property," said Mr. Graydon, "but I want Mr. Meredith's opinion on it. I will try and obtain it for the next meeting of the committee."

HANGED HIMSELF

Attempted Suicide of Stratford Man in Detroit.

Detroit, June 25.—John Hogarth, aged 30 years, son of a prominent Stratford, Ont., man, now deceased, attempted to hang himself this morning in the Hunt street police station, where he was locked up on a charge of stealing, and after having been wounded while resisting arrest. Hogarth's specialty was engine belts, several of which have been missed lately from factories in different parts of the city. The Piggins' Sons' plant lost three valuable belts in as many weeks. They then stationed watchmen in the factory.

Last night Piggins and his assistants caught Hogarth red-handed. On being called upon to surrender he refused, and rushed at the watchman with a big knife. One of the men fired a shotgun at Hogarth, and a number of the shot entered his body. He still fought capture until beaten into submission. He was turned over to the police, and two hours later, was found hanging in his cell by a strap he had worn as a belt, and was revived by the officers with difficulty. Hogarth is a morphia fiend and says he sold the belts to get money to buy the drug.
