## KUROPATKIN AT SHAKHE.

Reports from Russian sources give a more hopeful view of the situation of Gen. Kuropatkin's army. That commander has reoccupied and holds the Town of Shakhe, the possession of which for several days was first with one and then with the other of the contending

armies.

Reports from the Russian left wing, for the safety of which there had been much anxiety, are no later than the night of Oct. 13. It had been fighting for two days for possession of Tumin and Siatchoun Passes, important strategic points, but up to the time of the sending of the last despatch the Japanese are still in possession of the passes.

In order that this column may be able to rejoin the main Russian army, it is necessary that Gen. Kuropatkin should hold the bridges over the Hun River, and the position he now occupies on the Shakhe. There is no indication that the end of the great battle is at hand. Estimates of the losses show a wide divergence, but are as a rule lower than those given in Sunday's despatches.


