Dr. Pugsley and Votes for Women

His Resolution Calling for Universal Womanhood Suffrage Throughout the Dominion

Ottawa, April 30.—Parliament will consider the question of Dominion-wide womanhood suffrage at its present session. Hon. Dr. William Pugsley, who has been a champion of the cause for some years, submitted a resolution as a private motion in order to avoid a mere party division.

In response to a question by Sir Thomas White, who was leading the government, Dr. Pugsley stated, when he rose to present his resolution, that it was his intention to proceed with and press it. The Finance Minister then requested that it stand over until the return of the premier, Sir Robert Borden, in order that the leader of the government might have opportunity to consider and deal with it. Upon assurance given Dr. Pugsley, upon the return of the premier to press his resolution, he consented to allow it to stand over.

Text of the resolution is as follows:

"That whereas in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Ontario, the provincial franchise has been granted to women by legislative enactment, and in British Columbia the elections have been voted in favor of similar legislation.

"Whereas it is provided in the Dominion elections act that persons entitled to vote for members of a provincial legislature shall also be entitled to vote for members of parliament, but in respect to Alberta and Saskatchewan—alone of all the provinces in Canada—it is provided that only males shall be entitled to vote for members of the Federal Parliament, thus creating an anomalous situation as between the provinces, which should be removed.

"Whereas during the present Empire struggle the women of Canada have shown a most intelligent and patriotic interest in and an unselfish devotion to the welfare of the state;

"And whereas it seems but just and right that they should be given a voice in the direction of its affairs;

"In the opinion of this House it is desirable that provision be made either to grant to women who are qualified to vote for members of a provincial legislature the right also to vote for members of the Dominion Parliament, or to grant to women throughout the Dominion the right to vote for members of parliament, subject to such provisions and limitations as may seem reasonable to parliament."

New York, April 30.—Some patriotic American with a fortune in excess of \$64,000,000 has paid his income tax six weeks in advance, thereby losing \$8,750 in interest. The tax payer's name is withheld in accordance with the law, but the fact that he has handed a check for more than \$600,000 to the collector of internal revenue here was made public Friday.
