MR. ROOT BIGGEST AMERICAN WHO WAS NEVER PRESIDENT Selected to Go to Russia Because of His Experience in Diplomacy and His Shrewd, Calm Prudence. Elihu Root, one of the outstanding figures of contemporary American history, is in Petrograd on a mission of democracy to new Russia. President Wilson's choice of so noted a conservative on such an errand to provisional government made up of workmen's and soldiers' delegates is made less remarkable by a knowledge of his distinguished achievements as a diplomat. It was as secretary of state under President Roosevelt that Mr. Root won international fame as a shrewd and progressive promoter of international community, for while his enemies were decrying his foreign relations as those of "dollar diplomacy" the results of his South American tour were accepted generally as of great value. Elihu Root is one of the greatest figures in American life who has not recalled the presidency. As secretary of war under McKinley he helped to reconstruct Porto Rico, the Philippines and Cuba. Later, as senator for New York, he endeavored himself still further to the conservatives, but never ceased to be a national influence, now controlling the field as a presidential possibility. As a lawyer he is looked upon by his profession as a past master, and enormous fees are earned by him in regular practice as counsel. His enemies are fond of recalling that he was the attorney for the noted Tweed ring and was skilled in showing corporations and politicians "how to avoid conviction with penalties."

LOCAL NEWS (Continued) FUNERAL ON WEDNESDAY Chatham, July 16—The town wore an air of gloom today as the news of the death of Hon. L. J. Tweedie, ex-lieutenant-governor, became known and there was very general expression of sympathy with the widow and family. Many telegrams of condolence from public men throughout Canada were received. It was announced this evening that the funeral would be held Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock under the auspices of the Masonic order of which deceased was a prominent member. FEW ASSESSMENT APPEALS During this week the assessors will hear appeals for abatement in assessment. Many complaints have been heard in the street about the large increase in taxes, and it was not generally realized that there was an increase of about 27 per cent in the rate, besides the heavier valuation and a general marking up of incomes. Despite this street criticism, however, there were only about twenty-four at the assessors' office yesterday to appeal. This number is smaller than last year. However, the number may increase during the week.

WIDER PUBLICITY REGARDING THE WAR (From the Victoria Colonist) "A censorship which only permits the publication of comforting details is posing the right way to hamper recruiting and to dampen the spirit of sacrifice. Just as in England the people are pleading that the absurd restrictions which hedge about the publication of news should be relaxed, so in Canada an effort should be made, by wider publicity, to educate public opinion, and make the nation united in its efforts in the war. It is not because of what is published, but rather of what is withheld, that the public mind finds consolation in platitudes about individual liberty which are used as arguments against national service. The opposition to conscription is based on an entire misconception of the duty we owe to the state. Tell the people the truth, whether it is good or bad, and we believe that with the exception of some foreigners in our country, they are good enough citizens not to oppose anything which is for the best interests of the nation as a whole. The variety of arguments against the provision of man-power, at a time when our enemy is in the field with all his strength and ready to accomplish our extinction as a nation if given the chance, shows that the hysteria of war, and a half-knowledge of events and their possible consequences, do not make for a sane and sound public opinion."

CULTIVATE THE CORN AND THE POTATOES Corn and potatoes are now planted. It is hoped that they were put in under ideal conditions. It has been truly said that no amount of cultivation after a crop is planted can make up for a lack of proper preparation of the soil before planting. Ready to cultivation after they are planted and up. To kill weeds and conserve moisture, corn should be cultivated thoroughly and carefully when it is small. Remember that corn roots spread out between the rows and are quite close to the surface of the soil when the corn gets tall enough for the last time through with the cultivator. Consequently, to prevent cutting off and destroying the tiny roots by which the plants feed, care must be taken to make the last cultivation very shallow. Potatoes should be kept free from weeds.
