ANSWER FROM U.S. TO WILSON'S NOTE

Chicago Statistician Shows Britain's Action is Warranted

That Goods Pass to Germany Only Explanation of Increase in Exports to Contiguous Nations

In a letter to a Chicago paper on President Wilson's protest to Britain, Simon Thompson, a noted statistical expert, writes as follows:—

If President Wilson and Secretary Bryan had consulted the Department of Commerce they could not have charged British interpretation of the right of search as "directly responsible for the depression in many American industries."

The monthly summary for October, 1914, shows that our total exports for Europe for that month was valued at \$130,854,297, against \$181,697,940 for October, 1913. Moreover this was in the face of the following decreases in exports to countries immediately engaged in the war:

To the United Kingdom and Russia in Europe there was an actual increase in exports for October.

Prove Britain Justified.

The same summary shows the justification of the British right of search in the following figures of exports to countries contiguous to Germany and Austria-Hungary:

There can be no reasonable doubt of the ultimate destination of this abnormal increase of exports to countries through which they can be passed along into Germany and Austria.

President Was Mistaken.

Turning to another page of the same summary, it appears that more than the entire decrease in exports was due to the drop in exports of cotton from \$107,381,317 in October, 1913, to \$20,415,413 for last October—loss of \$86,965,904 on cotton alone, where there was a loss of only \$50,806,648 on all exports to Europe. As cotton is not contraband and is free to go to Germany except as a mask for contraband goods, it is hard to see how "the depression in many American industries" can be traced to any interference on the part of the allies with its free transportation.

The fact that the note to Sir Edward Grey should follow Germany's views in

regard to international law will not commend its reasoning or its policy to those who recall the culprit of the thief and the law. The law of the sea is the halter that is strangling the stranger of Europe.

LOOK SOON FOR RECRUITING ORDERS

Ottawa, Jan. 11—Orders sent out from the militia department for the recruiting of the third Canadian expeditionary force, which will be actively under way at all recruiting centres within a few days, will make each of the battalions of each battalion the dominion a recruiting headquarters.

Instead of following the plan adopted with the first and second expeditionary forces, mobilizing the regiments at once at military division headquarters, the plan for the third and all subsequent contingents will be to recruit the men by companies from each battalion at local headquarters and drill them there for a short time in company drill before they are mobilized as regiments.

That will ensure a greater local interest in the recruiting, and will mean that the men are in better shape for general regimental drill when the military district mobilization takes place.

Officers of each battalion will act as local recruiting officers, and the men as recruited will be at once sent to the local battalion recruiting headquarters.

TO A FINISH

"War without mercy" this is in sum the watchword, not of a French ministry, not merely of the French nation, it is the calm, deliberate, unmistakable resolve of three empires whose population far exceeds the half of this planet. It is precisely the resolve which a century ago wrecked the ambition and power of the most brilliant soldier, the most wonderful master of men the world has produced.

Germany has waged a "war without mercy" from the opening days. The trail of her advance and her retreat now stretches from Liege to Paris, from Tourn to Warsaw; her imprint is stamped upon the Yorkshire coast—New York Sun.

ATTEMPT TO INJURE L. A. DUGAL FAILS AND IS EXPOSED

A silly attempt to injure L. A. Dugal M. P. P. was made recently in an obscure paper published in Madawaska. The St. John Standard, in its issue of Jan. 6, joined in the cheap and idiotic scheme to injure Mr. Dugal's good name.

The whole business is exposed in a series of articles in the Daily Telegraph. Note these facts which are set forth: Mr. Dugal was for the first time political candidate in 1912, and was then elected.

In 1910, two years before he became a candidate, one Joseph Guy owed him \$21.60, the balance of a store bill. Guy paid this with a cheque from the department of public works, which he caused to be made out in Mr. Dugal's name. Mr. Dugal explained the whole transaction to the department at Fredericton when he heard Guy had done something irregular. A few days ago—on the eve of the Carleton county by-election—the Standard tried to make it appear that there was something wrong on the part of Mr. Dugal's party. Worse yet, the Standard failed to mention the fact that the payment in question—a perfectly honest one—was made two years before Mr. Dugal entered provincial politics.
