

CEREMONY HELD IN CEMETERY, PLOT BLESSED

Bishop LeBlanc Consecrates Addition to Catholic Burying Ground

MASS CELEBRATED AT ST. JOACHIM'S

Priests From Several Parishes Assist; Importance of Ceremony Pointed Out

With deeply impressive ceremony His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc on Monday morning blessed a large section that has been added to the new Catholic cemetery, a tract that practically doubles the size of the resting place of the dead there. Part of it is devoted to a perpetual care section. For the ceremony there had been placed five wooden crosses, one central one, where the main part of the ceremony took place and the others marking the boundaries of the new section.

ADDRESS BY BISHOP.

Before beginning the blessing of the plot, His Lordship made a short address to the number gathered from the city and the surrounding parts of the country. He referred to the importance of the ceremony of the blessing of the resting place of the dead. Their relatives and friends slept there and they themselves would there await the Resurrection Day. He told of the practice, even so far back as the days of the old testament, of setting apart places where the dead should rest together, and so down through the ages. The catacombs in Rome were instances of the cemetery in which they stood was a sacred spot. The church was doing all that could be done to make it well cared for and beautiful but the co-operation of the people themselves was needed.

Assisting in the ceremony were Rev. C. P. Carleton and Rev. Joseph Henebry, at deacon and sub-deacon, Rev. Fathers Duke, McDonald, Nichol, Boyd, Reynolds, Walter and Rev. E. Dolan, besides altar boys from the Cathedral and St. Joachim's church at Silver Falls. The orphan boys from Silver Falls, in charge of several Sisters of Charity, marched in procession to the cemetery for the ceremony.

At the conclusion of the blessing all went to St. Joachim's, where high mass was celebrated by Rev. W. M. Duke. Rev. F. P. Walker of Stella Maria church was deacon, Rev. Dr. Roy McDonald sub-deacon and Rev. E. Dolan master of ceremonies. His Lordship was attended by Rev. A. W. Kinella of St. John the Baptist church and Rev. C. Boyd of the Cathedral. Also in the sanctuary were Rev. E. Reynolds, Rev. M. T. Nichol of the Cathedral, Rev. Joseph Henebry of St. John the Baptist church and Rev. C. P. Carleton of Silver Falls.

Much has been done during the summer to improve the appearance of the cemetery and it has never looked so well as now.

CASES OF CHILDREN BEING LOOKED INTO BY MISS LAWSON

Junior Red Cross Supervisor Investigates Results of Recent Survey

While on her present tour of provincial centres, Miss Jessie L. Lawson, supervisor of Junior Red Cross, is making special visits to one or two of the handicapped children whose cases were reported in the recent survey made by the Junior Red Cross in co-operation with the school authorities and the Saint John Rotary Club. In the latest word received from Miss Lawson she told of having looked up one of the cases. More than 400 children were listed when the survey was made and each of these requires some remedial care.

WRITES OF TRIP

In writing of her present trip, Miss Lawson refers to Debec as a splendid Red Cross centre, with Junior branches in the local school and in the schools throughout the vicinity. The formation of a local Junior committee for that centre has been discussed.

Besides visiting Junior branches, Miss Lawson with Miss A. Barrington, organizer of home nursing classes, has addressed Women's Institutes and community meetings when both Junior work and home nursing classes have been spoken of. A considerable number of home nursing classes have been formed.

Miss Lawson has also been visiting a number of schools where the teacher is planning to organize Junior Red Cross.

Among the centres visited by the two Red Cross workers last week were Lichford, Cupid, Plaster Rock and Valley Brook.

Miss Barrington and Miss Lawson will return to the city on Thursday in order to be present at the Red Cross provincial conference to be held on Friday, when important matters concerning future activities will be discussed.

FLOODS WRECK VILLAGES

Many Lives Feared Lost in Heavy Rainstorm in Region of Karachi, India

BOMBAY, Sept. 6.—The worst rain storm in 20 years is feared to have caused heavy casualties. Centering in the Karachi district, 12 inches of rain fell in 36 hours, damaging shipping. It is reported that many entire villages have been destroyed by floods from broken dams. Railway communication is disorganized.

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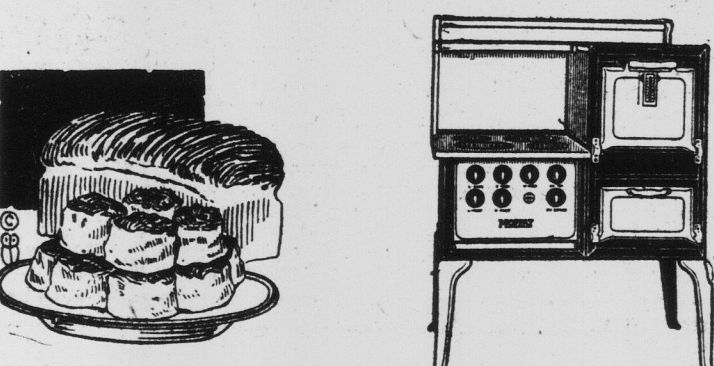
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
