

PILATE SUBJECT **OF SUNDAY SERMON** 

## Rev. J. S. Bonnell Gives Second of Series on Men Who **Crucified** Christ

A deeply appreciative congregation that taxed the capacity of St. Andrew's church heard a scholarly address last evening delivered by Rev. J. S. Bon-nell on "Pilate, the Vacillator." The sermon was the second in a series on the men who crucified Christ. Rey. Mr. Bonnell gave a vivid description of the magnificent palace of Tiberius Caesar, on an island in the Bay of Naples. Pilate ruled the Jews with an fron hand, he said, and forced on them the hated emblem of the Caesars. His spies had reported the activity of Christ and he expected a general uprising in Jerusalem during the Passover week. Mr. Bonnell in graphic language de-scribed the swiftly moving events that brought Pilate and Christ face to face. Pilate became convinced that the Nazarene was the leader of a harmless religious movement and not of a poli-tical uprising as he had at first feared. Knowing that Christ had been deliv-ered up for envy Pilate thought to re-lease Him but when faced with an impeachment before the tribunal of Ti-berius, Pilate surrendered Jesus, not daring to face an investigation of his corrupt administration. Mr. Bonnell related how soon after-wards Pilate had been recalled to Rome and banished in disgrace, losing all his ill-gotten gains. Like Judas, Mr. Bon-nell said, Pilate had wrecked his own life. The speaker in conclusion said that every man must face a decision
