

BELL PROPHECY, MADE HERE, IS QUOTED AGAIN

McKeown Refers To
Possible Future
of Radio

OTTAWA HEARING

Rail Board Chief Tells of Pre-
diction Made By Telephone
Inventor

OTTAWA, Ont., April 28.—
Prophecies of Alexander Gra-
ham Bell, inventor of the tele-
phone, as made in Saint John, N.
B., to Chairman McKeown, of the
Dominion Railway Commission,
were listened to with great inter-
est at a session of the telephone
rates hearing. Chairman Mc-
Keown was moved to repeat them
by a reference in the case to radio.
He suggested that even radio must
be considered by the telephone com-
pany in considering reserves and ser-
vice for the future.

WIRES WILL GO

"No doubt the time will come," he
said, "when we will do our telepho-
ning without the stringing of all these
wires overhead."

"No doubt," replied A. I. Peterson,
Bell appraisal engineer, who was on
the stand. "Which shows the need for
a high rate of depreciation for that
great wire structure now used."

Chairman McKeown told of visits he
had paid to Graham Bell's place at
Baddeck, Cape Breton, and how Dr.
Bell had often spoken of things un-
dreamt of then, but which had since
come into common use.

"He said that the time would come
when I could go into the woods with
some little instrument as big as this
pencil, put it down in the ground, and
call up my home miles away," said
the chairman.

WANT LIQUOR ACT FULLY ENFORCED

Platform Adopted By Commit-
tee of 100—C. R. Mesereau
is President

The Saint John committee of 100,
which is the Saint John City and
County branch of the New Brunswick
Temperance Alliance, held its annual
meeting last night and agreed upon a
definite platform in demanding the en-
forcement of the Prohibitory Law
which was said to be now laxly ad-
ministered.

C. R. Mesereau, the retiring chairman,
presided at the meeting which was held
in the Seamen's Institute with repre-
sentatives of about 30 churches and
welfare organizations present in the
gathering assembled. There was an
animated discussion of prohibition
matters.

The officers elected for the ensuing
year were as follows:
President, C. R. Mesereau; vice-
presidents, F. J. Steel, Rev. W. McN.
Matthews and C. R. Wason; secre-
tary-treasurer, Fred Cochran; ad-
ditional members of the executive, Rev.
H. A. Goodwin, Rev. C. T. Clark, W.
C. Cross, Robert Reid, M. E. Grass, L.
W. Simms, A. H. Chipman, J. S. Flag-
ler, Rev. W. A. Robbins and W. W. Chase.

ADOPT PLATFORM

The platform adopted was as fol-
lows:
The committee of One Hundred is
organized to promote the moral and
social betterment of the community
and more especially to co-operate in

the complete enforcement of the present
provincial Prohibition Act.

"The electors of this province have
made a definite pronouncement that
the traffic in intoxicating liquors must
cease."

"We are convinced that in the city
and county of Saint John there is a
strong sentiment demanding the en-
forcement of the Prohibitory Law
which cannot be ignored and that this
sentiment is becoming increasingly
active in the face of lax administra-
tion."

"We therefore insist that the present
provincial Prohibition Act be given its
full force and effect."

"We urge that immediate steps be
taken to force all vendors to sell with-
in the limits of the law and that viola-
tors be promptly punished as provided
in the statute."

"We also urge that all holders of
beer shop licenses, who have been or
who may be convicted of any violation
under the law, be dealt with as pro-
vided by the law."
