Since 1836

The King's Plate, a gallop of one mile and a quarter for Quebec raised horses three years old and over, which will be run at Blue Bonnets on September 8, as one of the features of the Montreal Jockey Club's autumn meeting of seven days, is the oldest special of continuous or almost continuous history of North American racing. Instituted in 1836 while William the Fourth, the uncle of Queen Victoria, sat on the throne of England and was known officially as King of Great Britain, Ireland and France, although France did not concede his sovereignty, it has always been an inspiring race.

The Saratoga Cup, the oldest weight for age affair of racing in the United States, a gallop of one mile and three-quarters for three-year-olds and over, does not go back farther than 1868. The Travers, Saratoga's premier special for three-year-old colts and fillies, was instituted in 1864; the Alabama, Saratoga and the States oldest race for three-year-old fillies, in 1872. The Kentucky Derby, which boasts, probably, wider popularity in the United States and Canada than any other American special of annual renewal, does not go back beyond 1875. The Jerome handicap, the Westchester Racing Association's most venerable special was run first at Jerome Park in 1880, the Belmont and the Champagne in 1887.

Fire Wardens Helped Burn Down Forest!

Under the supervision of the Forestry Department, a raging forest fire was produced in the San Fernando Valley in California, and in less than an hour the forest was a sea of flames. The fire started, twenty acres of giant pine trees were reduced to charred stumps by the flames. The sacrifice was made for a photograph, twenty cameras grinding on the blaze to record it for the spectacular climax in Reginald Barker's production, "Heaven's Flame,"
