### In Dayton They Take Library Right Up to Your Front Door



Dayton, O.—If you can't bring the people to the library, take the library to the people.

This is the idea behind Dayton's newest innovation, a library on wheels. Officials at the Dayton Public Library wanted to extend the service and get more books before the public. They didn't have money enough to build new branches so they hit upon the idea of a circulating library in a truck.

It is equipped with 600 volumes of selected fiction and carries 104 current magazines. You get your library card from one of the young women who accompany the truck and you draw the books you want. The only charge is the customary fine for keeping a book too long.

Goos Everywhere

The itinerant library goes over a different route each day and assistant

librarians go over the same route once a week in order that the reading public may become acquainted with them.

After the first week's operation, sponsors of the idea declared a long-felt need had been supplied and the library on wheels was a success. Hundreds of persons who never before had a library card are now duly enrolled as readers.

The trips of the book truck had no preliminary announcement and took an unsuspecting public by surprise, but the unsuspecting public rose to the occasion and asked for books by the score.

Miss Electra C. Doran, chief librarian, says it is "surprising but true" that people who have not been inside a library for years choose good books.

"The frivolous kind," she says, "are not in great demand. Books which

make a person think are the ones that are most wanted.

"We have divided the city into zones. Regular routes have been established in each zone and stations have been designated at which the truck calls once a week. From these stations library cards are distributed and books issued. In addition, the truck may be stopped along the street and books obtained right in front of the homes.

"We have decided to extend the service to rural communities just as soon as we can."

The traveling library is no inconspicuous figure as it ambles through Dayton's streets. Striking posters emblazon its sides, one of which reads as follows:

"Lincoln walked 20 miles to get a book. You have books brought to your door."

### HIT BY FLYING LOG, MILLMAN KILLED

Fatal Accident Occurs in a Campbellton Lumber Mill.

Campbellton, Nov. 22.—An accident occurred Tuesday evening at Shivers mill, Campbellton, in which E. Harold Dow of this town lost his life.

The piling of cedar logs which are usually placed near the mill to keep it running during the winter months had just been about completed, and ten or fifteen men were upon the pile attaching the logs to the carrier which hoists them and carries them to the mill entrance. When a lot of the logs were in the air over the pile the chain holding them together broke, and each man had himself to look after. Dow was 30 feet away from where the logs dropped, and one of the logs was thrown over to where he was, striking him forcibly and rendering him unconscious. He was at once rushed to

the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, where he expired shortly after arrival.

Dow, who was in his 26th year, was highly regarded and leaves a wife and four small children to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate husband and father. He is also survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Dow, six brothers, Walter and Harvey, in Ontario, George, Fred, Leslie and Lester, of Campbellton, and four sisters, Mrs. Philip Chelore, of Maple Green, Mrs. Ray Farver, of Redgewick, and Mrs. Chas. McIvor and Mrs. Herbert Ross, of Campbellton.

Rev. Dr. A. N. Marshall Invited to Wolfville Baptist Church.

Wolfville, N. S., Nov. 22.—(Special) At a special business meeting of the Wolfville Baptist church last evening the Rev. A. N. Marshall, D. D., of Ottawa, was invited to become pastor of the church to succeed Dr. J. H. MacDonald, who retired in September to accept a professorship on the theological faculty of Acadia.

Rev. Dr. Marshall is a native of Bridgetown, N. S., and a graduate of McMaster University, Toronto. Shortly after his graduation Dr. Marshall went to Australia, where he held successful pastorates in Adelaide and Melbourne. Later Dr. Marshall was brought from Australia to Canada and the United States by the Y. M. C. A. to give a series of addresses to mass meetings of men. He has held pastorates in Winnipeg, Toronto and Ottawa. He is known as a keen thinker

with a virile and attractive personality and as an eloquent preacher. If he decides to accept this call the church is to be congratulated on obtaining a scholar, a consecrated leader and a man of power.

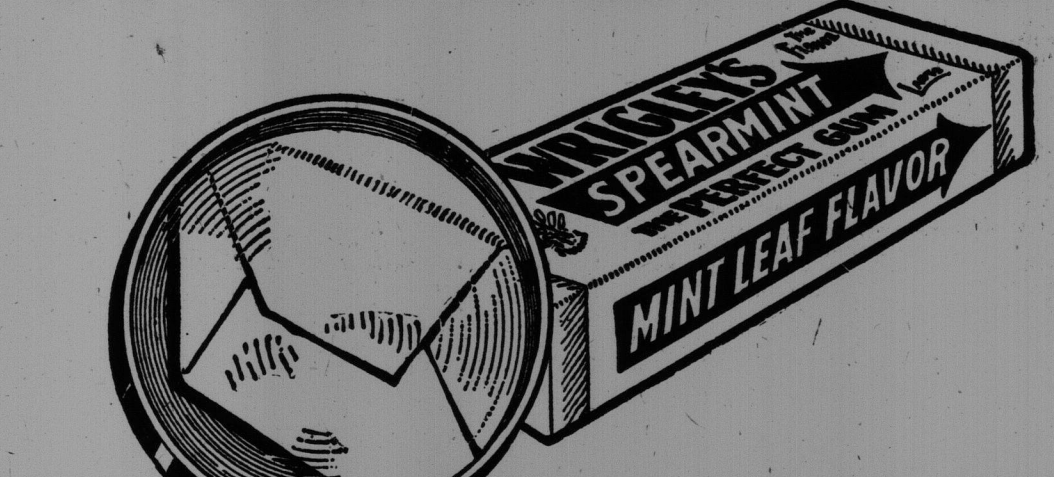
