Chicago, April 8.—"Kid" Gleason, the fighting manager of the White Sox, believes he has obtained a remarkable pitcher in Spencer Heath, who was a member of the Winnipeg team in the Western Canada League last season. Winnipeg won the pennant with a record of thirty-three victories and fourteen defeats. Heath worked in twenty-six full games, winning eighteen and losing eight. He also played twenty-six games in the outfield and had a batting average of .318. Heath is six feet two inches tall and weighs 200 pounds. BOLSHEVISM

IS DYING IN THE

MOTHERLAND

Tom Moore Brings Home

Word of Labor and Living

Conditions in England.

Ottawa, April 8.—Bolshevism is slowly but surely dying in England. Free speech is killing it. The old country labor man is learning the unsoundness of the doctrine, not from those who seek to discredit the movement but from the radicals themselves. Labor is becoming disgusted with the Reds and is showing that disgust by repudiating the movement.

So says Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, Canada's labor representative on the international labor congress held in England under the auspices of the League of Nations during the last two months, who returned to Ottawa last night.

He said the whole standard of living among the labor classes of Britain has changed. Wages are on a par with those of Canada and the cost of living is about the same. He said that British workers are not Bolsheviks but are undoubtedly rapidly moving toward state capital and control, especially in the key industries.

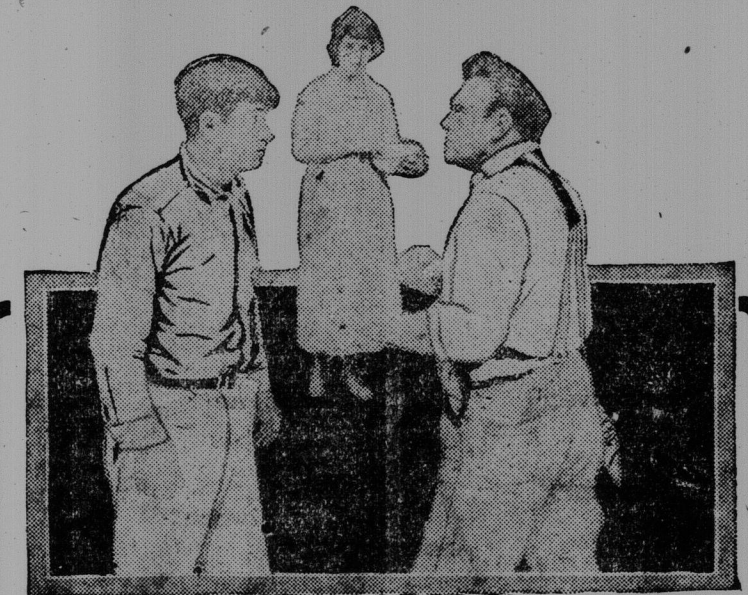
