ISHERY DISPUTE

WILL BE SETTLED

International Commission Ends Sittings and Will Report Sco 1

Ottawa, May 23—Having completed sitting in the Pacific coast the International Commission, which has been enleavoring to bring about settlement of ishery disputes between Canada and the United States, has come to Ottawa to ponsider recommendations to be made to the governments of the two countries. Some time ago the joint commission reached an agreement respecting disputes arising out of the Atlantic fishery treaties and that agreement was brought into operation as a war measure in both the United States and in Canada. Briefly stated, the arrangement opened the ports of both countries to fishermen of either country and also afforded free access for fishermen of one country to the markets of the other.

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On the Pacific coast the commission has been considering particularly the steps which should be taken to protect the sockeye salmon in the Fraser River and also the halibut. They hope to reach an arangement on this subject. This may be made operative as a war measure. A treaty subjected to ratification by the legislators of both countries will be necessary, however, to make permanent the settlements relative to old disputes on both coasts.

The United States commissioners are Hon. W. C. Redfield, secretary of Commerce; Hon. E. S. Sweet, assistant secretary, and Dr. Hugh M. Smith, commissioners of fisheries. The Canadian commissioners are Mr. Justice J. D. Hazen, of New Brunswick, formerly minister of marine and fisheries; G. J. Desbarats, deputy minister of Naval Service, and W. A. Found, superintendent of fisheries.



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
