New York, June 21—Americans in London off sharply 1-4 to 1 3-4. Cansels are down almost in the lowest price for generations. Copper metal is uneasy abroad. Dunn says: "Increased activity in retail distribution of seasonable merchandise due to the favorable weather, is reflected in slightly better wholesale demand."

Bradstreet says: "Sentiment is somewhat more favorable, relay trade has been helped by warm weather. Trade generally larger than last year." The stock market is in the rut again. The buying power is not large at present, and bears are encouraged to make a drive at it again. It remains to be seen if there will be any important liquidation. **CALLS CATHOLIC A MASON, HAS TO PAY \$25 DAMAGES**

Montreal, June 21—If a Catholic is called a Freemason he may, under certain conditions, claim damages, for such epithet is damaging to him in his honor, good name and sensibilities, according to a ruling handed down yesterday in the local superior court by Mr. Justice Denvers.

Joseph Dufresne, president of a St. Jean Baptiste Society branch, represented that Edmund Lachasse had made use of the words "Freemason" as an epithet of a nature to cause him injury. The court awarded nominal damages of \$25.

**JACK TWIN IN A DEFI TO ALL WHITE HOPES**

(Bangor Commercial, June 16)

Stand up, all you "white hopes" and listen to the voice of an old master, Jack "Twin" Sullivan, the bald-headed battler, who has perfected the greatest defense known to modern pugilism, has buckled on his armor and struck out for the path that leads to trouble. And when one of the fighting Sullivan clan sounds a war cry, look out for what may follow.

Sullivan who was battling for fame and gold when the present "white hopes" were trotting off to school, comes forth with an argument that you can't ignore. He says he can trim the best of the "white hopes" and means to demonstrate his ability in a whirlwind campaign, which he proposes to start in Buffalo.

With confidence characteristic of a man who knows what he's about, Sullivan trumped into the sporting department of the Commercial this afternoon and relieved himself of the following: "I want you to issue a challenge for me," was Sullivan's opening salute. "I'm going after all the 'white hopes' in the business, no one barred. I'm going to prove that I'm the best white boxer of my weight and inches in the world and if I can't lick all the 'white hopes' in a row I'll hide myself and join out as a member of a Dutch band."

"First, I want a crack at 'One Round' Davis or this fellow Soldier Kearns. I'd as soon have one as the other in the first bout. I have already trimmed Kearns and I can do it again. Buffalo fans think he's a bear, but I think he's a big lobster. If he's the best of the 'white hopes' then I'm the world's champion, for I gave him as fine a licking as he ever received in his life, when I boxed him a few weeks ago in Brooklyn."

"If Kearns doesn't want my game then trot out Davis. I boxed with 'One Round' and helped him beat Kearns, but that was purely a business proposition. Eddie Ehrmann, Davis' manager, came to me and offered me a snug sum to help Davis. I accepted, but the mere fact that I trained Davis cuts no ice with me. He's with the rest of the 'white hopes' I'll box them all, big or small. Davis has a three-round victory over me to his credit and I'll never rest easy until I wipe it out."

"If Davis or Kearns put me up I'll go after Gumbert Smith. When I boxed Smith here I gave him a battle he didn't forget in a hurry, but I wasn't myself that night. I was suffering from a terrible cold and at that I outpointed the man who thinks he's the champion. So it's Davis or Kearns or Smith, or any of the 'white hopes.' I don't care which one accepts my def. I'm going to pound each of them until they give me a whirl. When I get through I'll be the star of the 'white hope brigade.'"

After getting the foregoing off his mind, Sullivan said bye-bye for the present, announcing as he went forth into the sunlight that he would begin training this afternoon.

**SAYS HE WAS FORCED TO WALL YOUNG GIRL UP ALIVE IN TOMB**

Barcelona Mason Tells Remarkable Story on Being Freed By Captors

Madrid, June 20—The police of Barcelona are investigating the story of Esteban Gutierrez, a stone mason, who declares that he was forced to wall up a young girl in a building near the city. He says that two well-dressed men called at his home with a motor-car, and asked him to accompany them a short distance into the country to carry out some urgent repairs. When they were outside the city the men seized Gutierrez, bound him, and blindfolded his eyes. A few minutes later the car stopped in front of a lonely house.

The mason says he was led inside and ordered to wall up a narrow aperture. He heard some one sobbing, and, tearing the bandage from his eyes, he saw a young girl, bound with ropes and wedged in the aperture. His captors ordered him to build a wall so as to enclose the unfortunate girl, and when Gutierrez refused they threatened him with revolvers. He says that he was forced to comply with their commands, after which the car conveyed him to a wood several miles away.

Before leaving him in the wood the men gave Gutierrez \$20 in silver and warned him not to speak of the incident. He was found by a woodman, and he went at once to the police.
