



Sir Schomberg Macdonnell Succeeds to Fine Scotch Estate—Prettiest Princess on Globe, But Blind

(Copyright, 1912, by the Brentwood Company) Sir Schomberg Macdonnell, younger brother of Lord Antrim, has just succeeded to a very extensive estate and to a considerable fortune, through the death of old Mrs. Dugald Stuart of Lochearn, widow of Dugald Stuart, a great descendant of a celebrated lawyer, Sir John Stuart, who was vice chancellor of England. The estate embraces a great domain in Argyllshire, of some 10,000 acres, and which is one of the oldest game preserves in Scotland, having been formed by King James IV. for royal use.

Sir Schomberg Macdonnell succeeded Lord Esher as secretary of the department of works, a post which carries with it a salary of \$10,000 a year, and he is now to be seen in his office, and in constant touch with the royal family, since he has, by virtue of his office, received all their palaces and parks and all alterations and repairs have to be referred to him.

It was long the private secretary of the late Lord Salisbury, when the latter was prime minister, and was granted leave by his chief to take part in the South African war, where he served with distinction. He is not known in Washington, and while Lord Salisbury's secretary, occasionally used to visit his old friends, Lord and Lady Minto in Ottawa, taking in Washington on the way, and it is now known that it was thanks to his advice that Lord Salisbury kept on Lord Paton as British Ambassador at Washington, long after the date at which he should have retired; indeed, until Lord Pauncefote's death.

"Pom" Macdonnell—"Pom" being the nickname by which Sir Schomberg is known to his friends—is a better tempered man than he looks. He was formerly devoted to sport. He was singularly discreet, not to say reticent, and possessed in an altogether phenomenal degree the art of keeping his own counsel. He makes friends wherever he goes, and knows how to keep them, and he has the reputation of never forgetting an enemy. He is a recent convert to the British Museum, he was held up to obloquy in the press as "a particularly mischievous variety of the pest of the museum, the permanent official." But then to be denounced in this fashion is of a nature to command him to the treasury department, and to the government generally, since it shows that he is performing his work without fear or favor.

Baron Coles von der Bruggen, who is delegated by Germany to serve as her chief representative at the international congress on shipping and transportation matters, to be opened on May 25 next, in Philadelphia, is the head of a very old-established Coles family, the members of which have been in the service of the German emperors in the duchies of Coburg and Gotha, rather than in Prussia, or any of the larger states of the German confederation, considering that it is more agreeable to be a personage in a small country, than a nobody in a big one.

They are persona grata at the court of Coburg, and owing to the intimacy which prevails between Coburg and Berlin on the one hand and Gotha and St. Petersburg on the other, it may easily be imagined that the kindly word from Baron Coles von der Bruggen will prove extremely effective in securing permanent peace between the two empires. I call attention to this because a good deal has been published about the alleged trouble which the German officials contemplate making with regard to the presentation of Americans at the court of Berlin.

Khedive Abba's engagement of his daughter Amal, to the son of the Turkish minister and former grand vizier, Ferid Paasha, has created a good deal of sensation, not because of the word as a matrimonial, but mainly because the Princess is renowned as one of the loveliest and most attractive of her age to be found either in Europe or elsewhere. She has been both deaf and dumb from her birth. What adds to the seeming cruelty of the affliction, is that she is a most brilliantly gifted woman. In fact, she is getting the most attractive of all the princesses of the blood now living, as she is certainly alone among them in being deprived of the use of hearing and speech.

She is positively idolized by her parents and by her brothers and sisters, and among the Egyptian people at large her affliction is looked upon as a special token of holiness. It is fortunate under the circumstances that young Ferid has an excellent reputation as a gentleman, in the best Turkish sense of the word, and that is saying no little, as those who have resided in the Ottoman Empire are aware. For it were thought that any untoward influence could be exercised upon so politically and religiously influential a personage might be deplorable, both in Turkey and in Egypt. Ferid Paasha, the father of the bridegroom-to-be, is a man of about sixty, and perhaps the best proof of the sterling character of both father and son is that both of them enjoy, in an equal degree, the confidence and affection of the present khedive, and of the present sultan, and also of the older and more conservative part of the Turkish constitutional regime.
