**BULLET WOUND  
REWARD OF HIS  
HEROIC CONDUCT**

Young Italian Lad Received Shot Intended for His Friend—May Recover—Assailant Arrested

Montreal, Aug. 10.—Acting in the role of peace-maker, Victor Denis, a nineteen-year-old Italian, has evening saved the life of his friend, Emilio Ranco, aged twenty-four, but himself received a bullet wound in the head. Samuel Rosco, aged twenty-two, who did the shooting, has been arrested. All three are Italians.

Ranco and Rosco quarrelled at supper and Rosco went out and bought a gun and a box of cartridges. He entered Ranco's room and pointed the revolver at him, but just as he was about to shoot, Denis leaped forward and pulled Ranco back, getting between the two men. The shot, however, was fired and took effect in Denis' head after passing through his right ear. It is thought that he will recover.

Rosco will be arraigned tomorrow on a charge of attempted murder.

**VALUABLE FIND OF BURIED TREASURE CENTURIES OLD**

Russian Villagers Unearth Relics of Seventh Century—Persian and Byzantine

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.—A valuable discovery of buried treasure has been made in the village of Malaya Pereshchepina, in the government of Poltava. Some farm laborers while digging in a field came across an old chest containing gold and silver coins and vessels.

The coins date back to the fourth century, but the most valuable article is a large silver dish decorated in gold. It bears a Latin inscription showing that it is of very ancient origin and was in the possession of a bishop living in the seventh century.

Other articles include gold and silver vessels, a sword, a dagger, a brooch, a bracelet and other ornaments. The collection is valued by experts at about \$500,000.
