They have also great pleasure in announcing to their friends that the Rev. Dr. Twining has kindly acceded to their wishes and consented to become the President of their Society. Your Committee have no doubt that this appointment will be hailed with satisfaction by the various Branch Societies; and they trust that, under God, it will be the means of still further increasing the usefulness of their institution.

The Committee cannot close this report without mentioning that their funds were materially increased during the past year by the Legacy of £100, which was bequeathed to them by the late James Hamilton, Esq., of this City.

Your Committee trust that the brief reference which they have made to the wonderful efforts of the Parent Society in the distribution of the Word of Life, and the details which they have given of our own humble operations, will induce the friends of the cause within the sphere of our own auxiliary still to pesevere in the good work.
