LEDA LAMONTAGNE.

WHICH IS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL IN THE QUEEN'S BENCH.

Her Brother's Trial Now in Progress—Manager Suggests Her Acquittal—From Amherst—Classical Gold Medalist—Recently Married—Canadian Marley Exports—Brother's Friend Gately.

HALIFAX, Oct. 1.—Leda Lamontagne was brought before Judge Buxton yesterday afternoon and committed for trial before the Queen's Bench as accessory, with her brother, in the murder of her husband. When the evidence of Augustine Boucher was being given, making an entirely new and important disclosure, Leda lost her customary composure and appeared unsteady and very much excited.

Boucher stated that on the Monday following the murder of Mitchell, Leda went to him in the room where her husband was lying wounded and spoke to him in a peculiar manner. She said that her husband could not hear her. She asked Boucher if he could be helped for having shot Mitchell. Boucher replied, "I withdrew the word helped; I mean for having been present all the time when your brother was cutting her husband's throat as it was called by the whole looking on."

Lamontagne's brother, Mr. Gately, is another murder case on the docket. Boucher being accused of killing Charles Calkin at St. John, and a number of other trials at Amherst, Moncton, and other places.

Manager Suggests Her Acquittal.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—An action has been instituted against Boucher the manager of the Grand Opera House for posting in various parts of the city bills of the "London Gaiety Girls Company"—pictures which are alleged to be indecent.

Returned from Alaska.

Yukon, B. C., Oct. 1.—E. J. Glover, of the Yukon, has returned from the north by the "Paterson" yesterday morning. He reports the discovery of a rich placer gold mine in the Yukon north of the Yukon and Alaskan. Mr. Glover returns to Alaska next year.

Classical Gold Medalist.

Halifax, Oct. 1.—The Catholic committee of the council of Public Instruction has decided to grant a gold medal to two classical colleges. The medal will be awarded to the pupil who obtains the highest number of points in the classical examination.

Insanity Killed.

Conwall, Oct. 1.—John McMillan, aged 60 years employed on the canal was struck this morning by the down express and instantly killed. He was walking along the track west of the town on his way to work.

Canadian Marley Exports.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—The rush of barley from Canada to the United States has been going on for the past ten days is something unprecedented. Every available railroad car, boat and freighter has been pressed into service, and it is safe to say that before October the sixth, when the Mackinac will open into operation, there will be safely housed across the border 2,000,000 bushels of Canadian barley. The price is 70 cents as compared with 60 cents last year and it is expected that the value of this year's export will run into millions of dollars.

Northwest Found Gully.

Halifax, Oct. 1.—A gully of the mining district which has been on trial the last two days on charges of intimidating the miners working at the Wellington mines was found guilty by the jury. The chief justice found each of the two hundred dollars to appear for sentence when called returning that the full effect of their act has probably not yet developed. In rendering judgment the judge made the following remarks: "I suppose you never think, read or write, or if you do, you get newspapers edited by men just as ignorant as yourselves who only write what they know you will be."

An Embasser Arrested.

It has not been known that St. John has been harboring an embasser for some months past. Last night the Messrs Sabokas of Boston arrived here in search of E. P. Brager, who had with \$600 belonging to the Jewish Benevolent society of that city. Brager was secretary, and learned that he had come to St. John. The chief of police was informed of his suspicions, and last evening Detective Ring arrested Brager in the Exmouth street church, where he was engaged in painting. He was taken to the police station, and now has quarters in Captain Ring's office.

Brager is a fresco painter by trade and has been working with Messrs Harbour Bros in this city. He is about 30 years of age, is short and stout and wears a sandy mustache.

FOUND DROWNED.

A DECOMPOSED BODY PICKED UP IN THE HARBOR THIS MORNING.

It is supposed to be That of a Missing Man—An English Hotel The Verdict of the Coroner's Jury.

The body of a man was picked up in the harbor this morning about 9:30 o'clock. It was first seen by passengers on the ferry boat who informed Captain Pittman, of a woodboat. He towed the body into the harbor. From there it was conveyed to the dead house.

The body has apparently been in the water for about 10 days and is very much decomposed. The head is terribly swollen and there is a long cut over the left eye. The face is covered with blood and is almost unrecognizable and the body is swollen to about twice its original size. The man is supposed to have been a sailor on the ship "The Star" which was wrecked in the harbor.

Some clothes still remain on the corpse. A pair of new dark striped pants cover the limbs. A white shirt, which was also apparently new, has been torn and is on the feet. One shoe around the neck is on the left foot. The other has likely been washed off or kicked off by the deceased in a struggle for life, as the remaining shoe is a sailing shoe, and is likely to have been used for some time.

The hands are in a horrible state of decomposition, the skin in some places being entirely peeled off. There is a little hair on the back of the head and the face is beardless.
