

NEARLY TWO THOUSAND DEAD

TOLL OF PLAGUE IN ST. PETERSBURG

To-day Shows Slight Improvement in Awful Chelera Conditions.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 25.—The sharp frost of last night and the clear weather to-day have contributed to check the spread of the cholera epilemic. Three hundred and fifty-seven new cases and 167 deaths were reported at the municipal hospitals for the 12 hours which ended at noon day. This is a slight improvement over yester-

Among the deaths reported is that of an instructor in the St. Petersburg University. The total number of cases in the municipal hospitals alone now reaches 4,351 and there have been 1,-759 deaths. These figures are more than double the statistics of the coresponding fortnight of the last great utbreak of the plague in St. Petersburg which occurred in 1894. A total of 976 patients have been discharged rom municipal hospitals as cured.
