The Portland Press sees in the quar rel between Newfoundland and the States a great opportunity for Canada. "The United States," it says, "had the opportunity to bind Newfoundland to this country by the bonds of mutual interests and to benefit the trade and commerce of both. Instead of doing this it has deliberately thrown the chance away by amending the reciprocity treaty to death. By that short-sighted act it has made of Newfoundland a foe instead of a friend and had probably driven it into the arms of Canada, when detachment was rather the policy dictated by prudence. If it is not to be reciprocity, it seems that it is to be retaliation, and the first installment comes in the shape of bait revessels.
