Two Canadian Children Abandoned in Downtown Streets.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Aug. 31.—The next time Robert Sponey takes a notion to adopt a family he will probably think twice before acting in the matter. He was sent to the workhouse today for six months on a charge of abandonment. After he had been sentenced it developed that the two children, Rachel and Tom Garowitz, abandoned in the street by Sponey, are his sister's children, whom he brought here from Canada. He offered to adopt them shortly after his sister died at her home in Englehart, Ont. The father of the children is ill in a hospital at New Liskeard, and unable to care for them. Sponey says he simply got tired of having "the kids" around, so he "lost" them in the downtown streets, where the police found them later. They were sent to the Children's Home by the United Jewish Charities, and the authorities will make an effort to induce relatives at Englehart to take them back home.

LEGLESS GIRL'S ADVENTURE

Man Took Her Wooden Legs Leaving Her Helpless.

BERLIN, Aug. 31.—Some years ago a Berlin girl was found one winter morning lying senseless in the woods near Potsdam. She had been out all the night, which had been bitterly cold, and was frozen stiff, and could not move. At the hospital it was found that both her legs were amputated. Provided by the charitable with wooden legs, she learned in time to get about quickly on them. A few days ago she made an excursion into the woods which surrounded the little town in Koenigsberg. In the course of her wanderings she came to a deep-lying brook, and, feeling thirsty, she decided to descend to it and drink. As it was difficult for her to get down the slope on her wooden legs, she un- strapped them, and leaving them at the top of the bank, dragged herself down to the water on her hands and stumps. While she was drinking, three young men came along and noticed two strange-looking sticks lying by the path. As the girl was hidden from them by bushes they thought the things had been lost, and picking them up, walked off with them. Immediately afterwards they came into view of the afterwards they came into view of the sight of her property in their hands, set up a piteous cry. But the strangers did not hear her, or did not comprehend the meaning of her shouts. Mr. Innes Kierly, however, has given a complete denial to the stories. To an interviewer he has stated that no suggestion has been made for a further exhibition, and there is no truth in the rumor of an American exhibition being held there next year. The exhibition, he said, might be extended beyond October—just for a few weeks. All of the exhibits, however every structure—including the Stadium—would be demolished by next March.
