FRED LOGAN, OF ST. JOHN, DEFEATS ROBSON, TORONTO

Fred Logan won both the 220 yards and the 440 yards races at the Victoria rink last night, defeating Fred J. Robson of Toronto. The 220 was not satisfactory to the spectators as owing to a misunderstanding Robson failed to start and Logan covered the distance alone in 22-5 seconds. Robson afterward skated against Logan's time and did nothing better than 21 seconds. Logan covered the quarter mile in 28 seconds, breaking the rink record. His time in the 220 is equal to the world's record made by Bush in Switzerland a short time ago.

INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION

Home and Foreign — 271 Industrial Accidents in Canada in January.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—With the current issue of the Labor Gazette the department begins the publication of the results of the special investigation which has been in progress for some months into the increase during the past few years in the cost of living. In subsequent issues there will be given statistical reviews of the trend of wholesale and retail prices during the past twenty years in Canada with comparative data on the trend of prices in other countries.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

The total number of home and foreign accidents in the Canadian West during the calendar year 1929 was 271, a decrease of 1,498 as compared with 1928. During January 11 firms and 1,388 employees were affected by trade disputes in Canada. The loss in time in working days was approximately 44,894, as compared with only about 1,800 days in January, 1929.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

Industrial accidents occurring to 511 individual work people in Canada during January were reported to the department of labor. Of these 37 were fatal and 134 resulted in serious injuries.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

The removal of the German surtax at the end of this month will mean a fairly substantial reduction in tariff taxation, though it will not necessarily result in a reduction of the customs revenue in view of the fact that there has been a large increase in the importation of goods from Germany.

Since the surtax first came into force in 1923 the additional rate of duty that imposed on German goods has brought into the treasury the sum of \$12,885,699.
