NOISE, NOT ARGUMENT, THE OPPOSITION

Criticism of Local Government Has Been Without Force or Reason—Mr. Copp Proves a Dismal Disappointment Even to His Own Party.

Fredericton, April 6.—The members of the local legislature have all gone to their homes for the Easter vacation. They had been hoped that the budget debate would have closed and supply passed by this time but the number of opposition speakers who desired to square themselves with their constituents has been so great that supply is not likely to be reached until Thursday, and possibly not until Friday next. The provincial secretary brought down the budget on March 15th since then the debate has been going on almost daily. The lesser lights of the opposition spoke first, Mr. Copp reserving his oratorical effort until the end of the debate. Every opposition member with the exception of Dr. Sornay had his say. Gloucester was slated to speak before Mr. Tweeddale, but the member for Victoria took advantage of a favorable opportunity and a good gallery and jumped in ahead of the doctor. When the latter saw what had happened, he gathered up his papers and immediately quit the House, remarking that Mr. Tweeddale was always butting in where he was not wanted. At last accounts he was going and the chances are that Mr. Copp has lost a supporter for the remainder of the session, all because Mr. Tweeddale wanted a full opportunity to hear him deliver what he no doubt thought a very clever criticism of the administration, but which was really a very weak speech, lacking in fact, but well sprinkled with misrepresentation.

Another Weak Effort. The weakness of his supporters' criticism of the budget, if Mr. Copp into a somewhat lengthy speech in order to justify the existence of the opposition at all. This speech is not a particularly good one, but in the few hours Mr. Copp has spent on the floor, it may be truthfully said that he has so far failed to show whether the Government has done better or worse in every expenditure made. He had made no attempt to explain the millage added to the permanent fund, nor the management of the Central Railway matter, which has cost the province over a million and more of the permanent fund, laid on the shoulders of the taxpayers of the province by the old administration. Mr. Copp has had less to say this year than in previous years regarding what he calls the broken budget, and perhaps before the end of his speech he will repeat his utterances on these questions. If he does not he will disappoint the House.

Opposition A Joke. It is not saying too much to state that the present opposition is not taking any interest in the control of the primary education in provincial politics. Debate Long Drawn Out. The debate on the budget, while prolonged to an almost painful degree has brought out hardly anything worthy of answer by the government. Mr. Robinson's speech was more of a valedictory than anything else. He dealt with the question of provincial indebtedness from a standpoint he knew was absurd, and made no attempt to explain an increase of nearly \$5,000,000 which had been supported, and for a short time, was in power. He attempted to take credit for the increase of \$120,000 in the Dominion subsidy, which had been secured through the efforts of the old administration, but failed to refer to the fact that the debt placed on the province by the old administration had increased the interest charges to a sum more than equal to the increased subsidy. No opposition speaker has even attempted to answer the arguments advanced by Mr. McLeod in the budget speech, nor to explain away the figures he gave of the increase in revenue that has taken place under the present administration. It would naturally have been expected that Mr. Sweeney would have made some effort to justify the non-collection of stumpage, not only by himself, but by his predecessors in office. The dimensions of said dry dock to be not less than 115 feet usable length, 110 feet clear width at entrance and at least 37 feet in depth over all and keel blocks at ordinary high water Spring tide, and to be in three compartments. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. A person who is the sole holder of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made in any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, widow, brother, sister or sister of intending homesteader. Evidence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with him or her on the land or on a farm of at least 10 acres wholly owned, occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, or daughter. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties. A homesteader who resides upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to cultivate, pasture and cultivate 50 acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a second homestead in certain districts. Price \$30 per acre. A homesteader may live with him or her on the land or on a farm of at least 10 acres wholly owned, occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, or daughter. W. W.
