FINE HORSES

Canada imported last year almost as many Percherons as Chydesdales, according to the annual report of the National Live Stock Records just published. The Scottish draught horse has long been the preferred breed north of the St. Lawrence and the lakes, but the clean legged French horse seems to be rapidly overtaking him in popular favor. Still there are now in Canada about twenty thousand registered Clydesdale stallions and mares to three thousand Percherons. More than fifty per cent of the Clydes are in Ontario, while the Far Western provinces of Alberta and Saskatche-

wan have about sixty per cent of the Percherons. Importations last year numbered 185 Clydes and 163 Percherons, nearly every one of the lattenbreed having been purchased in the United States. Other importations included forty-dive Belgians, seven Shines and seven Suffolks.

Amongfi the breeds of light horses in Canada the trotter is far in the 1 id. importations from the United States in 1914 included 167 head, swelling the number of registered trotters in the Dominion to 2,591. The number of runners imported last year was 57 and the whole number in Canada is 753. Of English hackneys there are 902 and of other English coach horses 137.
