During these 41 years \$1 new companies have been organized in the State of New York, and of these no more than 24 remain, as the records show, leaving only 44 out of 186 colvent companies operating in New York 41 years ago and illoensed since, \$6 having been burned out of existence, leaving the 44 to continue the conflict with fire and the demands for lower rates and paternal for the Bun Fire Office, now in its third century.
