

When deposits are left in the hands of the accountant for the use of students, the latter may draw thereon from time to time, provided they have the *written* authorization of their parents or guardians.

The cleanliness and well-being of the younger students are entrusted to the care of the Sisters of the Holy Family, who also have charge of the culinary department, the laundry, and the infirmary.

Studies.

The studies are divided into two Courses: the Commercial and the Classical. French and English are taught with equal care.

English-speaking students enjoy exceptional facilities for acquiring a thoroughly practical knowledge of the French language. The instruction of the class-room is supplemented by unlimited opportunities for utilizing that instruction in conversation and general intercourse with fellow-students and teachers whose mother-tongue is French.

THE COMMERCIAL COURSE.

This Course is designed to fit young men for a business life. It comprises five classes: FIRST, SECOND, THIRD and FOURTH YEAR, and BUSINESS CLASS.

Book-Keeping is introduced in the Fourth Year, the author followed being J. C. Bryant.

The special commercial text books used in Business Class are: Bryant's Counting House Edition of Book-Keeping, Banking, etc.; Robinson's Arithmetic; Carhart's Commercial Law.

The programme of each class may ordinarily be completed in a year. Diplomas are awarded to those graduates of the Course who pass satisfactory examinations on practical commerce and the various branches pertaining thereto. Fee for Commercial Diploma, \$3.
