have been kind enough to send me since, it is plain the tremendous increase in their foreign trade is due almost wholly to foreign commercial agents of their respective governments. I feel sure one hundred live pushing men sent out to carefully selected parts of the world, would more than double our export trade in a very few years.

I cannot close without referring to the great kindness and unbounded hospitality of the people of Philadelphia. The best hotels were open to us, steam boats and trains were chartered for our benefit, and everything was done which a hospitable people could think of to make the delegates happy and their visit enjoyable.
