U.S. Planes Reach Trepassy Nfld

N. C. 1 and N. C. 3 MAKE 460-MILE TRIP FROM HALIFAX

TREPASSY BAY, Nfld., May 10.—In perfect condition after a 460-mile flight from Halifax, both the United States navy seaplanes, the N. S.-1 and the N. S.-3 arrived here at 4:14 p.m. and 8 p.m. respectively, to-day, marking the end of the second leg of their proposed Transatlantic flight.

Both planes made the trip without mishap. Thirty-mile gales were encountered most of the way. The visibility was low and only a few of the destroyers lining the course could be seen by the aviators.

The planes were equipped and the aviators will start across the ocean as soon as the weather is favorable.

American naval officers do not take seriously statements from the British aviators that their chances of getting away first are better. Without making comparisons, they point out that the assumption of the group of experts at St. Johns that seaplanes must wait for a calm sea is entirely erroneous, since they have no more intention of landing short of their destination than the British.
