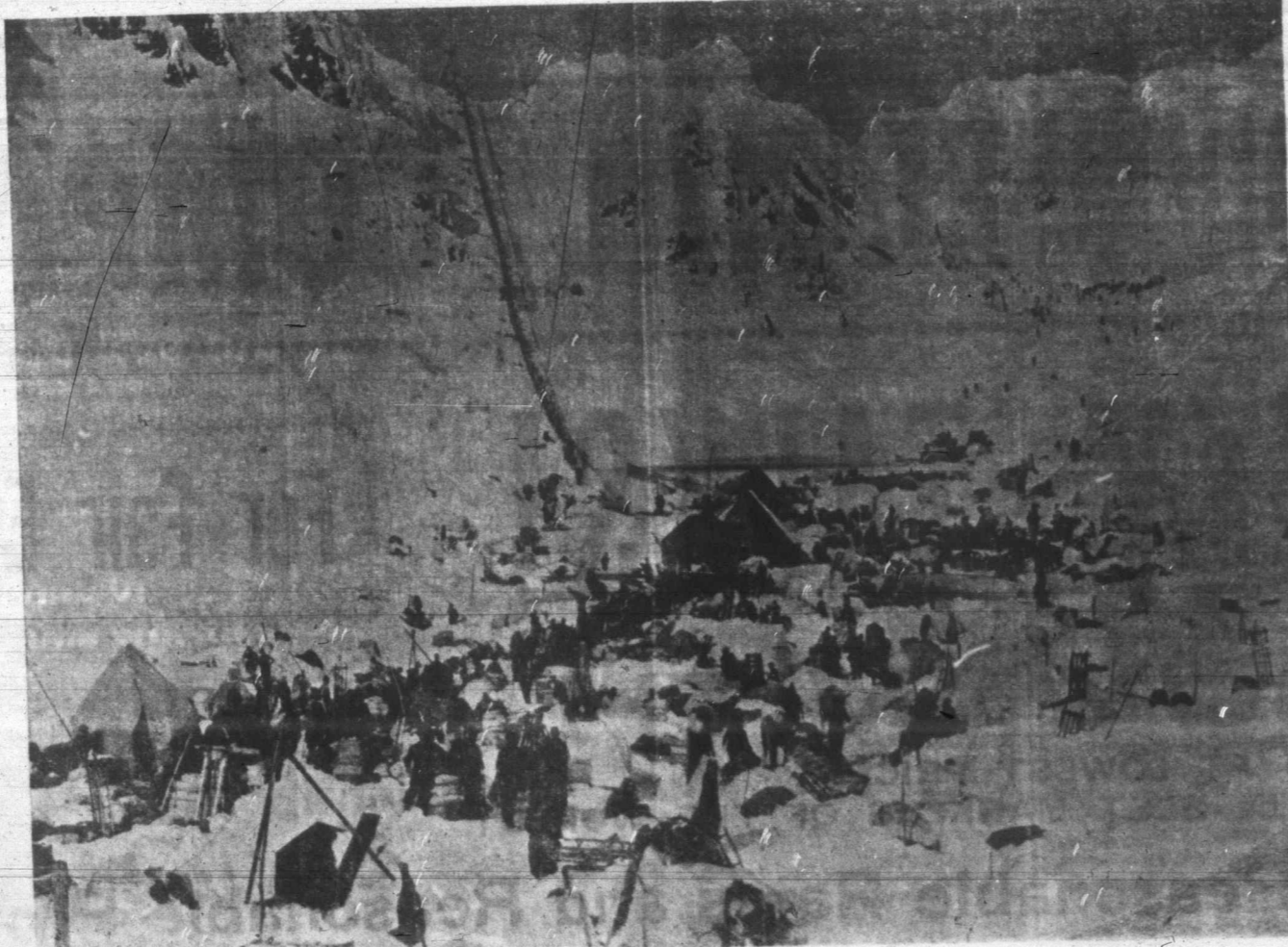
## WATER FAMINE IN DAWSON

Notwithstanding Fact That Yukon Remains Open.

Biennial Receding of the Water in Company's Well—Repairs Being Made Lengthening Suction Pipe.

The city this morning enjoyed the unusual experience of a water famine, notwithstanding the presence of a river skirting its western boundary and another on the south. At half past 10 customers of the water company who had occasion to turn on their taps were a little disconcerted at perceiving only a rush of air push forth instead of the usual copious flow of aqua pura. The reason was soon ascertained to be the scarcity of water in the well at the water works. Since the construction of the well a year ago last spring it has been observed that in the fall and spring there is always a very perceptible diminution in the water supply which does not occur either in mid-summer or mid-winter. The well is 34 feet deep, cribbed to the bottom with 8x8 timbers and usually contains from 12 to 14 feet of water constantly. The difficulty this morning was not observed until it was noticed the pump was hoisting air instead of water. An investigation showed but three feet of water in the well and the suction pipe was too short to be of any further service. Temporary repairs were at once made so that the water will be on again this afternoon, and tomorrow the suction pipe will be lengthened sufficiently to enable it to pick up any water remaining in the well. It is not imagined for a moment that any serious shortage will occur. The well is sunk on a well defined water channel which for over a year and a half has furnished an adequate supply for the plant which pumps 600 gallons a minute. That a water channel does exist and the supply does not come from seepage through the porous gravel from the Klondike is shown by the fact that the well dug two years ago by the Good Samaritan hospital was sunk 60 feet without obtaining any results.

"The supply in the well," said Mr. Buchanan of the water company, "is always short in the spring and fall, but for what reason I have never been able to ascertain. Such is not true in the winter even in the coldest weather, and I don't think we would have had any trouble this morning had our suction pipe been two or three feet longer. The remedy will be applied tomorrow and I do not anticipate any further trouble."

immediately back of the first named. Their total assessment is \$7,900 on the lots, \$9,000 on the improvements and \$20,000 on the personal property. The lots and buildings Mr. Heath did not consider worth over \$11,000, the lots being scheduled at \$2,000 each for those on Third avenue and \$1,000 each for those on Fourth avenue. The personal property was where the difference lay. Mr. Heath submitted a sworn schedule of his company's belongings, which was shown to consist of 24 horses valued at \$250 each; six wagons, \$200 each; nine sleds, \$150 each; 13 sets double harness, \$50 each; three express wag-

ons, \$150 each; three sets single harness, \$25 each, and sundries to the amount of \$500. Upon the showing made the assessment of \$20,000 on the company's personal property was ordered reduced to \$10,000.

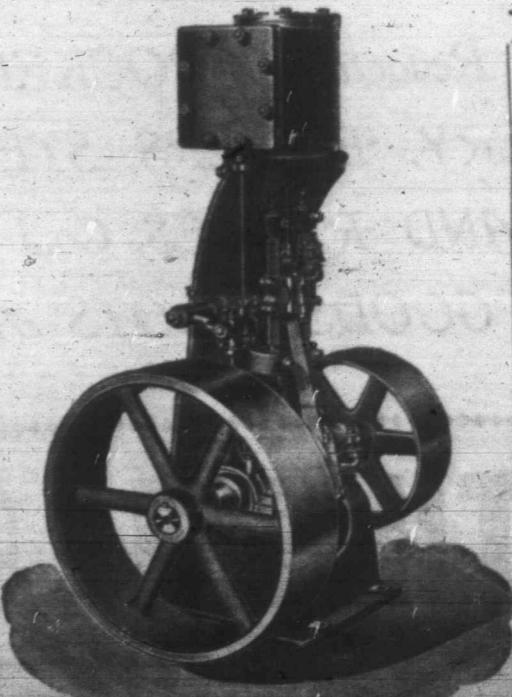
The adjourned case of Stanley & Worden, concerning the appraisal of the brick building on Second avenue was the last case to be heard. It had been referred to Assessor Smith for further examination and he had requested Dominion Architect Fuller to give an expert opinion on the matter. A letter was read from Mr. Fuller in which he stated the building was constructed on very boggy ground, and on account of the foundation not having been properly built the walls had settled considerably and cracked in various places.

He considered the assessment of \$10,000 a very fair valuation for a building in good condition, but it has been decried at least 50 per cent.
