There are also two oil refineries situated in the east end of the town, the one owned by the Ingersoll Oil Refinery Co., and the other by Mr. Stinson. The buildings of the Ingersoll Oil Refinery Co. are of brick and frame, and a large quantity of oil is here refined.

There are two newspapers published in the town, the *Chronicle* (the oldest newspaper in the County) and the *Daily News*.

CHURCHES.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND.—Situated on Oxford street west. It is a brick building, capable of seating 600. This church edifice, when fully completed, will rank as one of the finest churches in any town in Canada. The Rev. Mr. Hincks, incumbent.

KNOX'S CHURCH (*Presbyterian Church of Canada*).—Situated on St. Andrew's street, east of Thames. A substantial brick structure with a spire; built in 1857 at a cost of \$4,000. In 1864, an addition of considerable size was made to it, and it is now capable of seating about 800. Rev. John Straith, pastor.

U. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANADA.—Situated on Charles street west. This is a substantial brick building, erected at a cost of two thousand dollars, and capable of seating three hundred persons. Rev. Archibald Cross, minister.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL.—Situated on Charles street, on a rising ground; a brick erection, and built in 1868, seated for 350. Managed by five trustees. Rev. Mr. Hughson, pastor.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH.—Situated on the north side of King Street west. Erected in 1864 of brick, at a cost of \$7,000. Size 55 x 75. Capable of seating 1,000. Rev. John Learoyd, pastor.

THAMES STREET BAPTIST CHURCH.—Erected in 1864, of brick, at a cost of about \$4,000. Rev. Mr. Baldwin, pastor.
