## Russia Reports Desperate Fighting and Success.

PETROGRAD, May 5.—Desperate fighting with Russian successes at most points is reported from the battle line which now extends from Courland to the southern side of the Carpathians. The Germans it is freely admitted succeeded in forcing the passage of the Donalje River in Galicia, but they have been held to their new position for three days and have suffered heavily from the Russian gunfire.

## German Attack Repulsed With Loss.

PARIS, May 5.—The French War Office issued the following this afternoon

"To the north of Ypres the Germans yesterday evening delivered an attack against the left sector of the British front; they were repulsed and taken in the flank by the French artillery; they suffered serious losses.

"Nothing has been reported from the remainder of the front."




