HOW HAL CHASE TOOK REVENGE

Abused by Fans All Over Circuit, He Came Out On Top of the Heap
WON BATTING TITLE
In National League From All Opposers

Hal Chase won the batting championship of the 1916 National League—and what a wonderful personal triumph it was.

No man played under more adverse conditions than did "Prince Hal" in the season that is gone—First of all he was 33 years old—a base-age supposed to be far from a base-age player's prime, secondly he was half player's utility man for the Rhinelanders, being shifted from one position to another—a condition that would tend to unsteady even the most phlegmatic player and lessen his natural skill at bat.

And last—but not unimportant—Hal Chase was the target of more bitter abuse during 1916 than ever was aimed at any other ball player—he was scouted at, jeered at, "panned" from one end of the country to the other because he jumped to the Reds. Never a kind word was said about him. Whenever his name was mentioned someone would pop up to say: "Oh, he's a trouble maker; watch him wreck the Red."

But Chase, crushing back the anger that must have surged through him, silent under the lashes of criticism, never swerved from the path that he aimed to travel—the road that would lead him to the batting crest of the National League. And when the race was run, Hal Chase had come into his own.

Hal Chase had batted .329 in 142 games—a showing which caused the officials of the league to award him the crown.

Giant Pitchers Big Help to Chase

The hirings of John McGraw helped Chase materially in his dash for the Kingdom of Swat. Hal Chase faced the Giant moundsmen in 21 combats, laced them for 33 hits, including four doubles, three triples and a homer, and retired with a mark of .379—the best he made against any squad. He clubbed the Pirate offerings for .377 despite the opposition of one Cy Young, in five games—a showing which earned the Cub hurler for an average of .375.

But against the Braves—that's a different story. He was felled quite often. Twice to times did he bat against the Boston flingers—and the average he has was only .264 against his complete average of .329 for the year. That shows the slight fancy the twisters of those beanbaggers.

Once upon a time McGraw sent a fellow named Smith to face Chase. Hal liked him so much that he accumulated three hits in four times at bat for an average of .750. That was the best work he performed against any single pitcher. Jasper, D.C., Ph.C., encountered Chase twice—and Chase hit him for a .625 total. Kautheiser, also of the Pirates, was found for .556 in three games. Rube Marquard, of the Dodgers, was another soft one for Hal, who hit him for .553 in four games.

Jeff Tesreau, of the Giants, was another "pie" proposition for Hal, who bagged the seventh delivery of the "Oxark Bear" for nine hits in four games, giving him a .529 mark. Mamaux yielded .333 to Hal in five combats and so did Rudolph, of the Braves. Nehf, of the Braves, pitched his left fin against Hal 12 times in three games—and Hal grabbed off five safeties for an average of .477—the best average he made against any of Stalling's crew.

He Bats .240 Against Alexander

Eight times during the season was Chase called upon to face Alexander the Great—the most times he battled against any flinger. He went to bat 25 times against the wonderful Phillie made six hits for an average of .240. Which all things considered, wasn't such a bad showing.

Ragan and Barnes, of the Braves, were Hal's particular stumbling blocks. He faced each in three games. He went to bat nine times against Barnes and got one hit for a .111 mark. In 12 trials against Ragan he could get but one safety—a three-bagger, by the way—which made his season's batting mark against Ragan just .077.
