GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND LORD'S DAY ACT

RECOMMENDATIONS OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE

MONTREAL, June 11 .- John A Patterson reported on Sabbath observance and the Assembly adopted the following recommendations of the committee on Sabbath Observance:-

(1) That the General Assembly commend with favor the work of the Dominion and provincial Lord's Day Alliances to the earnest and practical sympathy of the church. (2). That the General Assembly express its cordial appreciation of the work done by the field secretary of the Alliance to preserve the Sabbath as a sacred heritage.

(3), That the General Assembly urge upon pastors and people severally and unitedly, within the circles their influence and responsibility, to advance the interests of Sabbath observance, not only on economic and moral grounds, however valuable these may be, but upon the higher and better basis of a Godgiven and Christ-recreated law, the principles of which strike deeply and firmly into the foundation of all that makes a nation good, and therefore necessarily great.

-(4). That the General Assembly urgently press upon all ministers to preach to their people on the sub-ject of "Sabbath observance" on the Sabbath recommended by the Lord's Day Alliance, or on a Sabbath as near to that date as may be con-

COLEMAN, Alta., June 11—Startolling evidence as to the effect of car shortage upon the earning capacity of the miners for one year was given to the Coal Commission yesterday afternoon by H. N. Galer, vice president of the International Coal and Coke Company. The miners were idle 55% days last year owing to shortage of cars and that meant a loss of \$250 to each miner employed, or a total loss to four hundred men employed at the miner of \$100.
